NES Openings Require Gr. 12

The value of continuing one's education to at least Grade 12 is being proven daily at the Charlottetown office of the National Employment Service.

George W. Cheverie, the local manager, said yesterday openings for young men with a minimum of grade 12 education are listed with the employment office for a local bank, a wholesale house, a mortgage company, a transportation company and more than one finance company and that there is a dearth of such young men available.

Discussing the present state of employment Mr. Cheverie said the list of employees available for any kind of work locally is as low as it ever has been. Skilled tradesmen are in brisk demand, and even labourers are in short supply.

At least 10 good construction laborers could be placed today, he said, and this situation will become even more acute in the next two weeks when the students who have been working for the summer return to college and university.

In the female branch, he reported a shortage of domestics, waitresses and cooks. On the whole he said, the supply of good stenographers was satisfactory but there is a good position available for a sten who is fluently bi-lingual.

Mr. Cheverie said he particularly wished to commend officers of companies who recently sponsored a full page newspaper advertisement in conjunction with the provincial department of education, encouraging boys to stay in school until they have completed at least Grade 12.

TORONTO (CP) — The Law Society of Upper Canada paid out \$258,290.25 last year to clients defrauded by their lawyers, a report shows.

The information has been carried to delegates at the Canadian Bar Association's convention here.

The Law Society of Upper Canada (the Ontario group) ran ahead of other provinces, paying in demittes on 101 claims filed against 21 lawyers.

Claims for the rest of Canada totalled only \$22,423.63, paid to the clients of 17 lawyers.

Criminologist Blasts Untrue Statements

MONTREAL (CP) — Professor Johannes Andanaes took issue here with sociologists who make sweeping and unsubstantiated statements against current methods of handling prisoners.

Professor Andanaes, head of the department of criminal law and criminology at Oslo University, said that "in both current criminological debates and the literature of criminology, statements about general prevention (of crime) are often dogmatic and emotional."

"They are proclamations of faith which are used as arguments either in favor of or in opposition to the prevailing system."

Speaking to delegates at the international criminological congress, he said "it is important that empirical questions about the effects of the penal system on the behavior of citizens become detached from ideological arguments so that they can be discussed dispassionately and without emotional bias."

"Certain untenable contentions are frequently reintroduced in various forms into discussions of general prevention, and it might be helpful to clear them away."

He attacked a series of statements, many of which had been made previously by delegates to this congress.

Among the statements against which he spoke were:

1. "Our knowledge of criminals shows us that the criminal law has no deterrent effects."

2. "The belief in general prevention rests on an untenable rationalistic theory of behavior."

3. "Legal history shows that general prevention has always been over estimated."

4. "Because people generally refrain from crimes on moral grounds, threats of penalty have little influence."

5. "To believe in general prevention is to accept brutal penalties."

Prince Philip Is Patron Of HMCS Haida

TORONTO (CP) — Prince Philip has agreed to become patron of HMCS Haida, a distinguished Canadian warship of the Second World War now doing duty as a memorial museum at Toronto's waterfront.

Haida Inc., the group of city men who bought the 2,500-ton vessel from Crown Assets last year, has received a letter from Buckingham Palace saying that the prince accepted the patronage request.

He will be invited to tour the Haida on his next visit to Canada.

The Haida, a 323-foot destroyer, was launched in England in 1943 and in a three-month period participated in the sinking of 14 enemy ships—four of them destroyers. The Haida also saw service in the Korean War.
