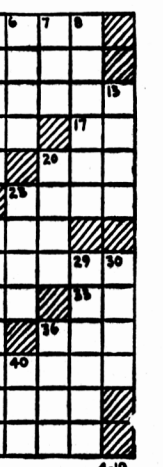

This was the bidding at one table:

East	South	West	North
1 ♠	3 ♠	Pass	Pass
2 (1) 3 ♠	4 ♠	Pass	Pass
4 ♠	Pass	Pass	Pass

Since East had passed originally, any action by West over one spade was something of a gamble, but at match-point duplicate most of the outstanding players take such risks in order to "compete." West could not, however, bring himself to bid his diamond suit at the two-level, and therefore chose to double a spade. If his partner could respond in hearts, that would probably be a safer suit; whereas if East had bid clubs, West then would be forced to risk a diamond bid. Actually, since East had a hand that was only a little short of opening bid requirements, he made the shrewd response of a cue bid in hearts, which was an announcement of a hand which was as good as it could be in the light of East's previous pass.

South tried to shut out the opponents by rebidding spades, and of course his bid was also intended as a game effort in case North had a little support. North did not feel that he could accept this invitation, and East ther. bid his diamond suit. West was well enough pleased with the four-diamond contract, and passed.

By playing the hand properly—specifically leading up to dummy's hearts instead of laying down an honor from that hand and having it "killed" by South's ace—East actually made five-odd, but he earned a very good match-point score without reaching game. South could have made four spades, as it happened, but this would have involved double-dummy play.

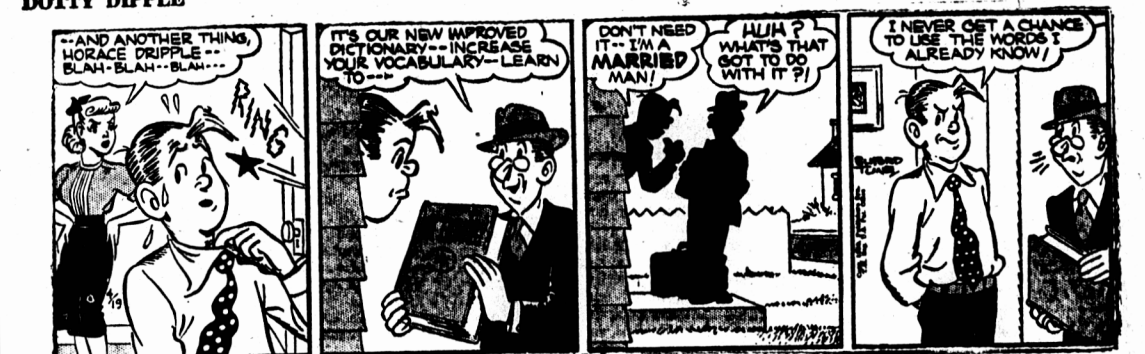

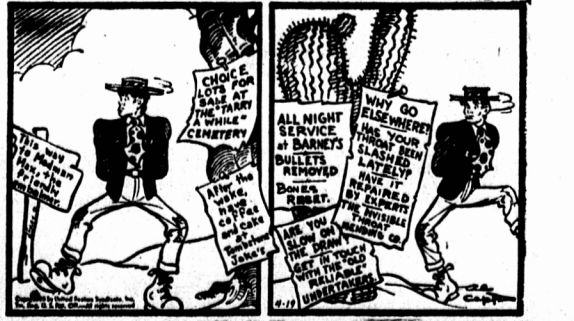
