

The Irish Compensation Land Bill.

This Bill has passed a second reading in the House of Lords, and may now be said to have been enacted. It simply provides that a tenant shall not be liable to eviction if it shall appear to the Court,—

(1) That non-payment of rent by the tenant is owing to his inability to pay, caused by distress; and

(2) That the tenant is willing to continue in the occupation of his holding upon just and reasonable terms as to rent and otherwise; and

(3) That such terms are unreasonably refused by the landlord.

It is undoubtedly a proper Act, and will afford needed protection to the tenants of harsh landlords.

The Right Feeling in England.

A number of celebrities lunched in the camp of the Canadian team at Wimbledon, on Thursday last. Among these were Lord Kimberly, Sir Stafford Northcote, Sir John Macdonald, Sir Selby Smith, Sir Charles Tupper, and Sir Alexander Galt. Lord Kimberly is Colonial Secretary in the Gladstone Government. He made several short speeches on the occasion. In one of them he is reported to have said:—

"The Canadians, in sending Sir Alexander Galt to this country, had taken a step which he looked upon as very valuable, and likely to promote harmonious relations between the two countries, as it was necessary that the interests of Canada should be thoroughly represented at headquarters, and that the Home Government should have every opportunity of understanding what was required. Such a step marked an epoch in the relations of the countries, and he looked forward to a close and intimate alliance between the two—not such an alliance as existed between independent nations, but such as should exist between two members of the same Empire, one of which had long since attained to greatness, and the other was on the road to do so. He believed that as Canada grew stronger and became a more important part of the British Empire, she would be quite as determined as now to continue the existing union. It might be relied upon by Canadians that whichever party was in power, England would always express sympathy with the people of the Dominion, and show due regard for all their interests."

We agree with the St. John News, that these are highly satisfactory statements, and that they indicate a rapid growth of right views in relation to Canada and the other great Colonies of Britain in the ranks of British Liberalism.

The Smuggling Case.

It is reported that a man named Clarke, who does business at the Westward, is the owner of the contraband goods recently seized by the Customs officials at Summerside. The case has, we understand, been referred to the authorities at Ottawa, and they will, doubtless, deal out justice to the offenders. We hope that the honest dealers and tax-payers of the country will be protected and the rogues punished.

A Dangerous Bridge.

The reports of the dangerous state of the roads, which appear in the Opposition prints, must, of course, be received with a very large grain of salt. So far as we can learn, the roads and bridges of the Province are in a very fair condition. The bridge at the head of Grand River (near Barlow's Mills) is, however, a notable exception. It is in a highly dangerous condition, and should receive the immediate attention of the Public Works Department. A person crossing it, with a skittish horse, after nightfall, could only escape by a miracle or some special interposition of Providence.

Fatal Cattle Disease in Pictou.

The Dominion Government has been informed of a fatal cattle disease which prevails at Pictou, and Principal McEachern, of the Agricultural Department, has been at Pictou investigating the nature of the disease. He has not yet completed his work, but says that it has a dropical tendency, and in no cases have diseased animals recovered. It is said to have prevailed more or less in the vicinity for 30 years, and it is Dr. McEachern's belief that it is caused by improper food and exposure to cold in winter, although the disease does not become fully developed until the following summer. About forty head of cattle have died in Pictou during the past year, and while in some cases the farmer has lost all his horned cattle, his nearest neighbors all have escaped entirely. We are pleased to learn that Principal McEachern is of opinion that the disease, having risen entirely from local causes, can in no way endanger the cattle trade of the Dominion.

The cost of the Afghan War, as shown by papers recently laid before the Imperial Parliament is \$75,000,000. What portion of this large expenditure will be assumed by the British Government is not yet known.

SIR JOHN LEBBOCK has just given the Linnean Society another instalment of the results of his observation of ants. He concludes that these insects possess something approaching language, and can summon their friends to help them on occasion.

ANNUAL CONVENTION.

The delegates met in St. Patrick's Hall this morning at about 9 o'clock, and thence proceeded to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where a pontifical High Mass was celebrated by His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown. The Rev. Father Doyle, of Summerside, preached an appropriate and excellent sermon, in which he presented Temperance as a Christian Duty to God, to our neighbours, to ourselves, and to mankind in general. In the name of our Lord and of His people in this Province he congratulated the Union upon the success which has thus far resulted from their labors, and trusted that they might go on until domestic peace, happiness and religion should take the place of intemperance and the evils which follow in its train.

The Convention met in St. Patrick's Hall for the transaction of business at 1.30 p. m., and will enjoy a trip in the Southport later in the afternoon.

There are several cases of diphtheria in town. Two children died with this much dreaded disease within the past few days.

Clothes-line thieves carry on their nefarious business in this town to some extent. Several lines have been stripped of clothing lately.

A handsome brigantine of 210 tons, built by Mr. Daniel McLellan for David Montgomery, Esq., was successfully launched on Monday last. A large number congregated at the shipyard to witness the launching of this vessel. She will be commanded by Capt. McRae, of Point Prim.

On Monday evening last, we had the pleasure of listening to a very eloquent address delivered by J. H. Bell, M. A., of Ottawa. The subject was the "Art of Public Speaking." The lecturer showed himself to be a master of the "Art." The lecture was listened to by a large and attentive audience, who showed their appreciation of the remarks made by the learned gentleman by their hearty applause. Finlay McNeill, Esq., occupied the chair. At the close, short addresses were made by the chairman, Rev. J. H. Collins and Senator Howlan. A vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Bell for his very able lecture.

While speaking of the lecture the question might here be asked very appropriately.—Is it not time that the town authorities were taking some steps towards preventing a certain class of boys from annoying public entertainments given in this town? There can be no denying the fact that the manner in which they acted during the delivery of this lecture was a disgrace to the town of Summerside. During the delivery of the lecture he had to stop some time until the noise had subsided.

The Manufacture of Paints in Canada.

Montreal papers report, (and congratulate the country upon the fact) that Messrs. Lewis Berger & Sons (limited) of London and Sheffield, Eng., are manufacturers of celebrated brands of white lead, paints, colors, etc., which sold largely in Canada. Under the new tariff they find it necessary, in order to retain their Canadian custom, to manufacture their goods in Canada, and they have accordingly erected factories at St. Gabriel's Locks in Montreal. Their works, which cover two acres of ground and are filled with the best machinery, superintended by skilled workmen trained in the firm's English factories, are now driven to their full capacity, turning out white leads and paints. They give employment to 300 persons. The house has been in business for a century under the same name and the goods are understood to be standard articles.

IN MEMORIAM.—Death of one of the best known and most respected residents of Fort Augustus.—Surrounded by her sorrow-stricken family and by friends who had known and loved her from her tenderest years, Mrs. William Duffy died of erysipelas, at Fort Augustus, on Thursday, the 22nd July inst. She was born at Shore Settlement, Lot 36, March 17th, 1833, so that at the time of her death she was in her 47th year. Her illness was of long duration but was borne with patience and christian resignation. Mrs. Duffy was a good Catholic, a beloved mother and a genial friend. During her sickness she was frequently inspired by the consoling visits of the Pastor of her Church, Rev. Allan J. Macdonald, who administered to her the last Sacraments. The high esteem in which she was held by her many friends was shown by the large and respectable funeral train that followed her remains to the parish church where a Solemn Mass of Requiem was offered for her soul. It seems very sad to think that one so good, so patient and so kind, has been hushed in the sleep of death and now lies in the silent tomb. There is one hope, however, to give consolation to her dear husband, children and friends, more than that of any earthly condolence, it is the hope that her sweet companionship has not been forever broken; that when our pilgrimage in life is ended we shall meet again in Heaven never more to part. She lived out her life quietly, peacefully and purely, doing her whole duty as God gave her to know it. Sorrow at such a death is soothed by the thought that this good woman has awakened from the sleep of death to that of joy whose fullness is the possession of God. While any language her friends may use falls short of expressing their sentiments, their hearts will ascend with prayers to the Almighty Creator for her soul's repose.
