CONTRACT BRIDGE

Over South's four diamond bid, West, who had not yet spoken his full piece, showed his spades, greeted enthusiastically by North with a business double. East, content, passed, but South, his defensive values dangerously impaired by North's previously announced diamond length, ran to five diamonds.

West's six club bid, somewhat doubtful procedure, panicked North into six diamonds, which East—the only player at the table looking at normal distribution—sanguinely doubled.

West led a spade, and the course for declarer was smooth. He ruffed the spade, cashed the king and ace of hearts, and trumped a club in dummy.

Then, in alternating order, he ruffed spades and clubs in rhythmic cadence until he had scored twelve tricks—two heart tricks and ten trump tricks. Twenty-high card points held by the defenders in spades and clubs fell like tenpins as the crossruff relentlessly continued. The freak distribution—a double void—exacted its toll.

Not that there was a great deal to the play—there wasn't—but South's technique in first cashing two heart tricks before embarking on the crossruff is worthy of mention.

Had declarer neglected to cash his top hearts early enough in the hand, East would have had an opportunity to discard a heart on the fourth round of spades from dummy, and South would have been defeated.

Make Some Progress At Talks On Nuclear Tests Suspension

GENEVA (AP)—British and U.S. efforts to break the stalemate in the nuclear test suspension conference produced some results Tuesday. The delegates finally began detailed negotiations on a key control problem.

The three powers sought to resolve conflicting East-West ideas on policies a test ban—the issue on which the success or failure of the talks depends.

Informants said the arguments turned largely around the mangle of the proposed 180 observation posts designed to prevent any of the three nations from making secret atomic and hydrogen weapons tests.

Soviet Delegate Semyon Tsarapkin said some of the Western proposals opened possible new avenues of approach from the Russian side.

He told reporters the U.S. and British delegates took a step forward Monday by agreeing to drop their demand that the life of a test suspension treaty be linked with progress in general disarmament.

High Costs Lead To Demise Of B.C. Mobilehome Plant

VANCOUVER (CP)—High wage costs, prices and freight rates have been blamed here for the demise of a lower mainland manufacturing industry that had an annual payroll of \$100,000.

Pacific Coast Trailers Limited in adjoining Burnaby shut down its 9,000-square-foot mobilehome manufacturing plant, cutting off jobs for about 30 persons.

R. H. Cripps, Pacific's vice-president, said British Columbia's high labor costs and high prices forced the company to shut down the manufacturing end of its operation even though the trailers were manufactured for the B.C. market.

CHEAPER TO IMPORT

He said it is more profitable for the company to import fully-manufactured units from Eastern Canada and the United States despite transportation costs, and custom duties.

Freight rate costs, he said, make it cheaper for the company to haul trailers from Ontario plants to the West by its own
