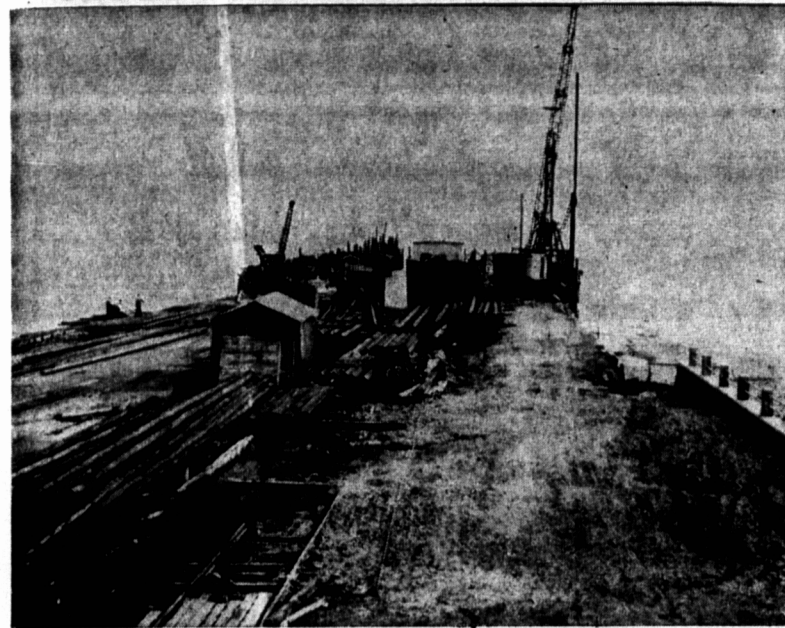


FOUR CRANES PLACE STEEL PILINGS OF RETAINING WALL



THE NEW RAILWAY WHARF AT GEORGETOWN

Extensive Reconstruction At Georgetown Railway Wharf

Rapid progress is being made on the Georgetown Railway Wharf reconstruction project, underway since early in the summer by the Diamond Construction Co. Ltd., of Fredericton, N.B. Removal last winter of the frost-proof warehouse, built in the late 1920's, set the stage for the new and largest reconstruction job ever done in Georgetown and perhaps the largest wharf reconstruction job to be done in the Province.

When completed the wharf will be 920 feet in length and will have an average width of 175 feet. On the wharf will be erected a frost-proof potato warehouse, 320 feet in length and 66 feet in width, with a 12 ft. high side wall.

OFFICES It will contain three separate offices, one for the wharfmaster, one for the potato inspectors and an office for the shippers. There will be lavatories and stevedore's room. The boiler room will be fire resistant. The County Construction Co., has the sub-contract for placing the large sand and clay fill on the wharf approach.

This fill runs from the shoreline out to the 225, a distance of approximately 250 feet on the wharf's East side and 155 feet on the West side. About 19,000 tons of fill have already been placed, with about 3000 tons yet to be placed. 2000 yds. of gravel have been used by County in the concrete retaining walls and about 400 yds will be placed later in the laminated deck, which will surround the warehouse.

RETAINING WALLS The concrete retaining walls, now erected by County Construction, run out from the shore—225 feet on the East side and 155 feet on the West side. The walls have a 6 1/2 ft. wide footing, which is 2 feet deep and are 8 ft. 2 in. high and taper from 5 ft. to 2 ft. in thickness. They have a 2 in. galvanized pipe railing, supported by 11 in. by 11 in. concrete posts, which are 2 1/2 ft. high. Into the retaining walls went 5000 bags of Portland cement, each bag containing 87 1/2 lbs., supplied by Maritime Cement Co. Ltd., of Moncton, N.B.

From the concrete walls, interlocking steel sheet piling run out for a distance of 320 feet, with a stone and gravel fill between the steel walls. The walls are tied with steel tie rods. The 77,400 tons of interlocking column steel sheet piling were brought to Georgetown by freighter from Belgium and were supplied by Vaughan and Shaw of Montreal. They average in length from 32 ft. to 56 ft. and are 18 ins. wide.

The tie rods used, weighed 70 tons in all and are 2 ins. to 2 1/2 in. round and were supplied by Steel Company of Canada. WOOD PILING Commencing from where the steel piling leaves off and running outwards for a distance of 375 feet is round crosstie wood piling, averaging 50 ft. to 76 ft. in length. They are British Columbia fir and were crosscut in the Province of Quebec. 1400 pilings were freighted by rail to Georgetown. They were supplied by Canada Crosscutting Co., of Quebec Province.

Into the wharf construction will go square crosscut timbers supplied by Canada Crosscutting Co. of Truro, N.S.; Joseph Libby

Saint John, N.B.; and by Diamond Construction, which were treated at Newcastle, N.B. Twenty-nine car loads of this treated timber has already arrived in Georgetown, with 2 to 5 carloads to come. Approximately 60 tons of chains, plate washers, bolts will be used in the construction and supplied by York Structural Steel of Fredericton, N.B.

The timber bolts are supplied by Saint John Iron Works of Saint John, N.B., and are 3/4 in. to 1 1/4 in. by 18 in. to 36 in. length. FOUR CRANES Equipment on the job includes four cranes; one of 1 1/2 yd. size, with a 100 ft. boom—two of 3/4 yd. size with 50 ft. boom and one of 1/2 yd. size with a 40 ft. boom. The wood piling is driven from

a floating pile driver, with swinging leads, 72 feet long. The steel piling are put in place with a crane. The driving hammers are operated by automatic double-acting steam or air.

The Diamond Construction Co. have erected offices, cook-house, bunk house and scales at the head of the wharf, on the south side of Water Street. IN CHARGE Officials in charge of the project are: Superintendent—Henry Benoit of Tracadie, N.B.; Wood piling—Lloyd MacDonald; of Point Au Carr, N.B.—Steel Pile driving—Severe Basque of Upper Sheila, N.B.—Timekeeper—Edmund Savoie of Tracadie, N.B.—Cook, Alphonse Martin of Neguac, N.B.—Government Inspector, William G. MacDonald of Souris-Assn Gov. Inspector—Walter Rodgerson of Peakes—Government Engineer—Mr. Rozman of Charlottetown. 40 men are engaged on the job, including Diamond Co., keymen and operators.
