Good! say all the skaters. THE Abegweit football team arrived home from Pictou on Saturday evening. SEVEN Montreal stores and churches were entered by burglars on Thanksgiving night. REV. DR. LATHEEN enters upon his duties as editor of the Provincial Wesleyan on Dec. 1st. MR. R. BORRAIDALE, Inspector of Inland Revenue arrived here on Saturday evening last. SEVENTY-FIVE new dwellings have been erected at Port Elgin, N. B., during the past four years. THE winter time-tables of the Intercolonial and Windsor and Annapolis railways go into effect to-day. KING returned to Halifax to-day, having conducted the services in St. Peter's Church during last week and yesterday. DURING the season, 34,350,000 superficial feet of dead have been exported from Parrsboro, N. S., and some 170 vessels have entered that port since the first of July last. ROSCOE CONKLING, describing a witness on the other side of the case—"Gentlemen, I think I can see that witness now—his mouth stretching across the wide desolation of his face, a fountain of falsehood and a sepulchre of rum." A BOY named Patrick Largey, while hunting in the woods, near Sherbrook, Que., on Thanksgiving Day, for deer, was overcome by cold and fatigue, and while his companions were gone for assistance, laid down and died. At the inquest a verdict "accidental death" was returned. A MONTREAL despatch says:—As the steamer Montreal was coming up from Quebec on Friday night, she was hailed for relief by two men on a bateau near Sorel. The steamer lay to and threw out a line, and the men, in attempting to catch it, upset the bateau and were both drowned. THE brigantine NYANZA, from Cardiff for Vera Cruz, before reported grounded off Sorel, has been dismantled. On account of bad weather it was found impossible to discharge her. She has been declared a total loss. The brigantine with material and cargo has been sold by auction for about \$700. WE are pleased to learn that Mr. Stephen O'Brien, of the Boston Journal, has been elected President of the Boston Press Club, and that Mr. James J. Roche, of the Boston Pilot, has been elected a member of the same club. Both are Island boys, and take high rank among the journalists of the "hub." ADVICES from Ottawa are to the effect that the bank and Dominion note circulation at the end of October was the largest in the history of the Dominion for the time of the year, indicating a large increase in general business. The total circulation was nearly \$51,500,000, which is \$18,000,000 more than the same date in 1878. THE issue in Prince Edward Island last week was the classes against the masses. The masses had declared against a useless and expensive Senate; but the classes rallied to the defence of their privileged chamber, and have succeeded in prolonging its costly existence. This was a Reform victory.—Toronto Mail. At Galt, a few weeks ago, Mr. Blake told a Reform audience that the Government had promised a large revenue from the Northwest as a result of the expenditure upon the Canadian Pacific Railway, but that the pledge had not been redeemed, the net receipts from the sale of lands in the territories from 1880 to 1885 having been only \$300,000. A report just made shows that the receipts from colonization companies alone from 1882 to 1885 was \$377,453. Mr. Cameron, of Huron, had evidently misinformed the hon. gentleman again.—Toronto Mail. JOHN HALL, a Westville, N. S. farmer, has been lodged in the Halifax jail on a charge of bigamy. Hall is a man 68 years old, with a wife and family at Westville, where he has lived for over thirty years. A few weeks ago on a return message from England, he made love to the stewardess of the steamer Carthaginis, a matronly widow named Mary Patterson, wd at Newfoundland induced her to marry him. He assumed the name of John Sparks, to deceive her, and under that name wedded. On arrival at Halifax he deserted her and was found by the authorities at his home in Westville. THE many friends in this city of Mr. John E. Boyd, C. E., all regret to learn of his death, which occurred at Quebec, on Thanksgiving Day, after short illness of some days. Mr. Boyd was a son of Dr. John Boyd, another was a son of N. B. John Boyd, another was a son of N. B. He studied engineering in England, and on returning to New Brunswick was engaged on many public works. He was employed for a long time on the road between St. John and Shediac. He was also the engineer of the P. F. Island Railway. Entering the Dominion government service, he was in charge at St. John for some time, and about 1880 was transferred to Ottawa. Latterly, he has been doing work in Quebec. Mr. Boyd was in his 53rd year and leaves a wife and three children, who are the orphans of all in their addition.

Stipendiary Magistrate's Court.

TWO YOUTHFUL BURGLARS AND A NOTORIOUS CHARACTER SENT UP TO THE SUPREME COURT—FOUR SCOTT ACT CASES, THREE OF WHICH WERE FINED AND ONE POSTPONED—TWO DRUNKS ATTENDED TO. A goodly number of spectators were present this morning. The docket was also fairly large. Two young lads, named Earnest Smith, familiarly known as "Oiney," and Joseph Dunne—the former about twelve and the latter about fourteen years of age—were charged with breaking into the store of Mr. D. Small, on Water Street (west), and stealing therefrom a number of articles, among which were twenty figs of tobacco, six boxes fish hooks, one tape, a quantity of brass grimeets, blacking, envelopes, etc., etc. Mr. Small testified that between one and two o'clock this morning he was aroused from his slumbers and informed that burglars were at work in his store. As soon as possible afterwards he was on the scene, but the burglars had decamped. An inspection of the premises showed that an entrance had been effected through a window in the rear of the store, and that the thieves, after going through the place, had left several articles strown around the floor. He searched about for a clue to the burglars, and discovered the footprints of two parties leading from the store in the direction of Lord's Wharf. He followed these footprints and discovered that they terminated near a stable on the wharf. This stable was on blocks, and he surmised that as the footprints did not lead from the stable the thieves were hidden either in it or under it. He waited about for a while, and when his son and two other men came along they searched under the stable and there found the youthful burglars. He then took them to the police station, where they were searched and their booty was found on them. His Honor then asked the boys what they had to say in their defence. They made no reply, and he sent both up to the Supreme Court for trial. Alice Smith, the mother of "Oiney" was next arraigned charged with being a receiver of stolen goods. Sergeant Cameron stated that in company with officer Bradley he had this morning visited and searched Mrs. Smith's dwelling for goods supposed to have been taken from Small's store. He found the brass grimeets on the mantel. He asked Mrs. Smith where she got them and she told him she had bought them from the Italian who sells images about the streets. The sergeant then told her to tell the truth about the matter as he knew quite well that the Italian did not sell such things. She then told him that "Oiney" had found them somewhere and had brought them home. Officer Bradley found the tape in an old box in the corner. The sergeant looked at it and asked Mrs. Smith how she came by it. She told him that the boy had brought it home on Sunday week and had found it in some yard. He also found a lot of pens and sand-paper. The boy told him he had purchased the pens and had been given the sand-paper. Mr. Small was then re-called and identified the articles shown excepting the pens and sand-paper. He also said that since the arrest he had made the discovery that the thieves had entered the sail loft and store-room as well as the store, and while in the store-room had filled three sacks with lead. Mrs. Smith took advantage of the privilege accorded her and delivered a somewhat lengthy address. She said that on last Sunday week the boy had gone with her to church and after church had gone to Sunday school, and it was while he was away from her to Sunday school that he had obtained the tape. He told her that he had found the tape in a yard near the railway where the Sunday school was. She chided him for taking it and told him to take it back. As for the brass grimeets they had been in her house since last June. It was a common thing for the boy to find things in yards and bring them home, although she had often chided him for so doing. She had tried her best to make a good boy of her son, but other boys had led him astray, and she wished he were dead. His Honor remarked that he did not believe one word she had said. She was an abandoned character, and her boy, for a Sunday School attendant, was an accomplished thief. He sent her up to stand trial in the Supreme Court for being a receiver of stolen goods. A man who keeps a store on Prince Street, near the Ferry wharf, was next arraigned, charged with a violation of the Canada Temperance Act, first offence. He did not respond to his name, and after the officer had testified to the serving of the summons the trial was proceeded with. The first witness testified that he had purchased what he supposed to be whiskey at the bar in the defendant's house this month. The second had drunk a glass of ale there on Thursday evening, but had got it as a gift. The third said he had got some gin from the defendant but did not pay for it. He told him he wanted it as medicine for a sick child. He would not swear the liquor was a gift, and thought he owed him about twenty cents for it. A fine of \$50 or one month's imprisonment was imposed. The Marshall reported that the lower Queen Street man, against whom a Scott Act warrant had been issued a few days ago, had not yet been found, and was supposed to be off the Island. His Honor said he wanted to have the warrant executed, and ordered a further postponement for one week. The Upper Queen Street man, against whom there are two charges for violation of the Scott Act, was missing also. After looking into the affair, His Honor imposed a fine of \$50 or one month's imprisonment for the first case, and \$50 or two months for the second. Two drunks were also disposed of, one for \$2 or eight days, and the other for \$1 or four days. Court adjourned. The Great Eastern steamship has been converted into a show vessel, and for the first time since her construction is making money for her owners. The ship, which for several months has been on exhibition at Liverpool, has lately gone to Dublin, where she will stay for the winter. Only her screw propeller is now used.
