BRITISH.

The London "Times" anticipates a deficiency
in the corn crop.
Lord Walter Campbell, son of the Duke of
Argyle, has been admitted a member of the
stock-broking firm of Messrs. Wagg & Co.

Recently a foreign embassy sought the
assistance of the English police to find a
young girl who had just become the heiress
of many millions. The instructions were
given, and the kindest detectives, at the end
of six weeks the detective reported at head-
quarters and handed in his resignation.

Two instances are mentioned in the Lan-
cet of untoward cases, in which the gas es-
cape from human beings to domestic animals.
In one case whooping-cough was communi-
cated to a cat from children. In the other
case dogs took small pox from persons suf-
fering from that disease.

It is reported that the German Govern-
ment has addressed a formal complaint to
Russia in regard to the recent infraction of the

An interesting life history.—An old man

tried for his abduction, his wife being not
yet of age, and was condemned to ten
years in the galleys. The daughter was
assigned to a semi-conventual institution.

attitude in the Herogovinian difficulty.

A horrible finding.—A terrible stench for
several days about the house 194 Putnam
avenue, Brooklyn, has led to the discovery
of a dead body. Its owner, Gustave Richter,
was sitting in a chair with a discharged pistol
in his hand and in a disgusting state of
decay. He had not been seen for three
weeks, and it is supposed that he committed
suicide at grief from the loss of his wife and
business difficulties. He is reported to have
been rich, and was childless.

John Hines, a negro farm hand at Rock
Wharf, Virginia, was attached to a
valuable horse which he had the care. The
horse slept in the barn near the animal, and
was assiduous in his attention. The horse
was injured so badly by a collision with a gate
that it was necessary to kill him. Hines was
pride of the horse, and he would die,
too, and meant it, as the sequel proved.
The horse was taken to the edge of a wharf
and shot. At the discharge of the gun the
negro jumped into the water, and although
planks were thrown to him, he would not
save himself.
