He is shown above receiving his certificate, with the highest standing in his class, on completion of a course as Safety Equipment Technician Group 1, at R.C.A.F. Station Alymer, Ont.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. John Blackett, Little Pond, he joined the R.C.A.F. as a linesman at 17 and spent the war years in Newfoundland and Labrador. In 1918 he was posted to the West Coast where he worked at maintaining the R.C.A.F. land line from Edmonton to the Alaska border.

After discharge in 1947 he returned to the Yukon, where he had been stationed for some time, and worked at prospecting, big game hunting, on paddle-wheel boats plying between White Horse and Dawson City. He also worked in Hamilton until May, 1951 when he joined the Army as a linesman in the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals. After training at Kingston, Petawawa, Shilo and Wainwright, he went to Korea, stopping several days in Japan on the way. After a year he returned to Canada and was discharged at Halifax.

In May, 1954 he joined the R.C.A.F. and was posted successively to St. John's Que., Resolute Bay, N.W.T. (in the shadow of the North Pole), Centralia, Ont., and then in January, 1955 to I.T.T.S. Jewish Women Urge passing Of Libel Law

MONTREAL, (CP)—The National Council of Jewish Women of Canada by resolution Tuesday urged the federal government to pass a group libel law as a means of protecting ethnic and religious groups from hatred, contempt or ridicule.

The resolution said the council realizes "the enormity of racial hatred friction" and supports the principle of group libel legislation "framed in such a way as not to interfere with fundamental civil liberties."

Adopted unanimously by the 100 delegates representing 5,500 council members from 15 Canadian cities the resolution said the law "recognizes the dignity of man and declares some cases criminally offensive for anyone to trifle with a person's honor and position in society."

It added that "matter published or uttered without legal justification or excuse about an ethnic or religious group of individuals in the Dominion of Canada is likely to expose such group or the individuals thereof to hatred, contempt or ridicule."

In another resolution, the council passed unanimously, the council complimented the federal government for its handling of the Salk anti-polio vaccine.

Delegates heard Mrs. Willen of New York, president of the International Council of Jewish Women, describe the work of her organization which represents Jewish women in 15 countries.

Former Member Under Arrest SWEETSBURG, Que. (CP)—Gaston Ledoux, 34, former Liberal member of the Quebec legislative assembly for Shefford, was arrested Tuesday and arraigned in court here on a charge of receiving stolen goods. The arrest came less than a week after Ledoux resigned from the legislative assembly for what was described as "personal reasons." He had been elected for the first time in the general provincial elections of 1952. He was taken into custody at his summer home in Austin, a resort on the shores of Lake Memphremagog a few miles south of Sherbrooke. A provincial police warrant charged him with illegal possession of a \$600 diamond ring. They said the ring was found in Ledoux's garage after it was reported missing following an April 15 robbery at the home of Jacques Noizeux of Granby, Que. —A.C.
