

Three Day Hockey School Concluded Yesterday

The annual Department of Physical Fitness Hockey School, which concluded yesterday with a turkey dinner and a film of the 1933 Stanley Cup finals at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Brigadier W. W. Ried, Director of the Physical Fitness Department, presided over the dinner and introduced the guest speaker, Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education.

Dr. Shaw congratulated Brigadier Ried and the hockey school before telling the students that they were making a real contribution to their communities by encouraging athletics and developing clean sport.

In his remarks Brigadier Ried expressed his pleasure that the National Hockey League could spare linesman George Hayes for a few days to conduct the school and that the school was able to devote their time to give instructions.

It was gratifying, he stated to see that a number of the outlying districts in the Province were able to send representatives to take part in the school. He noted with satisfaction that many communities now have their own referees.

At the conclusion of the dinner John Richard expressed the gratitude of the school to the Physical Fitness Department and to the instructors for the knowledge that had been imparted to the students during the past three days.

The N. H. L. film depicted the Montreal Canadiens and the Boston Bruins in the Stanley Cup finals which the Canadiens won four games to one.

The instructions yesterday were given by Johnny Squarbrick and Ivan Nicholson. "Snag" held a morning session from ten to twelve while Nicholson held school in the afternoon.

Squarbrick, one of the better forwards developed in the City, spoke on offensive team play. Nicholson dealt with the psychology of coaching and the importance of training and conditioning.

With regard to the school candidates Nicholson suggested that they should stress the basic skills in their dealings with minor league players.

Speaking of hockey sticks he encouraged the use of a centre line rather than a right or left shot.

George Hayes, the chief instructor at the school, was forced to leave yesterday for Montreal. He will work the Red Wings-Chicago game in Detroit tonight.

Among those who attended the school and whose names were missed in yesterday's story were Navyman Zimmer and Gommer from Halifax.

To Discuss New Junior Schedule

MONTREAL, (CP)—Representatives of Junior Hockey in Quebec and Ontario will get together at Montreal today to discuss a new schedule for the Quebec Junior Hockey League and interlocking arrangements for games with teams of the Ontario Hockey Association's Junior A division.

There will be no QJHL games until the new dates have been worked out.

Necessity for the new arrangement follows purchase by Quebec Frontenacs of the Quebec Citadelles club.

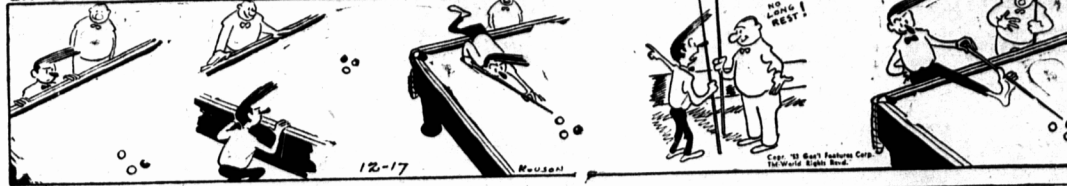

MEDICINE HAT, Alta., (CP)—An amateur hockey scoring record of three goals in 12 seconds has been set by Bill Naismith, former Medicine Hat forward now with Great Falls Americans in the Alta-Mont Intermediate League.

Confirmation that Naismith's Saturday night feat at Great Falls, Mont., against Medicine Hat Cantalinas was a record came in a telegram received here Wednesday from W. A. Hewitt of Toronto, registrar-secretary of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

The previous record was held by Jack Shill, former member of Toronto Maple Leafs of the National League, playing for Toronto Mariboros against Sudbury Wolves at Maple Leaf Gardens in 1932. Shill scored three goals in 26 seconds.

Still Watching For Bogus Bills

TORONTO, (CP)—RCMP officials here said Wednesday they are still watching for counterfeit \$20 bills despite a report from Ottawa that a suspected counterfeit bill picked up Monday in Toronto was declared genuine by chemists.

The bill was originally suspected because of its darker color and blurred numbers, apparently caused by contact with oil of some kind.

Inspector J. S. Cruickshank said police believe the oiled genuine bill was used by someone to make counterfeit money by means of the "transfer method." He said it is quite possible there is counterfeit money circulating with the same number.

Chicago Black Hawks Deny Club To Quit NHL

CHICAGO, (CP)—Chicago Black Hawk officials Wednesday again denied persistent rumors that the club will move out of the National Hockey League.

The latest report appeared in the Toronto Star in a story by sport editor Milt Dunnell.

"It sounds like another guy is up in the air," said Johnny Gottselig, former Hawk star who now is a front-office man. "All I know is that Mr. Wirtz (Arthur M. Wirtz, Hawk president) recently said the reports were silly and nothing has happened that I know of to change that comment."

A Chicago Stadium spokesman who declined to be identified said: "Where would the Hawks go? Hockey has deep roots here. It's just a matter of the Hawks getting players. Those 15,000 people who used to storm our gates for every home game haven't moved away. Good hockey by the Hawks will bring them back."

With 16 games played so far this year the Hawks have played before only 104,070, an average of only 6,504. The largest crowd had been 10,019.

TORONTO, (CP)—The Toronto Star said Wednesday it has learned from authoritative sources the Chicago Black Hawks will withdraw from the National Hockey League unless players are forthcoming to strengthen its roster.

A similar report appeared in a Chicago newspaper two weeks ago. Clarence Campbell, NHL president, said he has no new information on the Chicago situation.

He denied the puck and the delayed penalty rule went into effect. The argument arose over where the face-off should have taken place. Roddie Cummings was the only one in the school who agreed with the decision that referee Bill Chadwick made over facing off the puck in the circle at A's end of the rink. The rest, including Hayes, agreed that the face-off should have taken place outside A's territory but disagreed over the exact location. The result was a hot dispute.
