Woman Advises Against Military Career For Girls

Dear Mary Haworth: My letter may help the woman who opposes her 20-year-old daughter's desire to join the Air Force as a military servicewoman and I sincerely believe the mother should try to prevent her daughter from enlisting.

The mother can sit deep in thought, but it does her to sign the papers, take her daughter to the barracks and assist her in getting suitable civilian employment in a nearby city she may bring the conflict under control.

By enclosing her daughter a measure of freedom in a new environment, where she is Miss Nancy Smith on her own, rather than the Smith's little girl at home, she may disavow much of the daughter's rebel feeling.

Money will be a real problem; so will clothing. A thoughtful mother who can afford it ought to help her daughter by being a bit more generous at birthdays and Christmas.

Don't be harsh with the girl for enlisting. Her mistake will be all too apparent and painful soon enough.

P.S.—I am 39, married, have three children, am a Christian and a church member. I have done and showed films and conducted a discussion on gardening.
