

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, Nov. 16. The steamer Columbia, of the Anchor Line, arrived at midnight, to-night, from London, after a very stormy passage of fifteen days, during which her boats and deck houses were smashed and hatches broken in.

OTTAWA, Nov. 16. In the Supreme Court to-day, the Queen vs. Doutré, an appeal from the Exchequer Court, was then taken up; Lash, Q. C., for appellant; Laflamme, Q. C., for respondent.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 16.

The jury in Guiteau's case was completed to-day and the jurors sworn in a body. Mr. Scoville said certain articles of the prisoner had been published, which got out against his will, and which he (Scoville) did not endorse; and as he expected the assistance of eminent gentlemen not residents of the district, he feared, if such publications were sought to be given out without his sanction, the legal fraternity might be averse to rendering him assistance.

During the examination of witnesses, Guiteau prepared an appeal, addressed "To the Legal profession of America," in which he says: "Any well known lawyer, of criminal capacity, desiring to assist in my defence, please telegraph without delay to George Scoville, Washington, D. C. If, for any reason, the application will be refused, the name will be withheld from the public."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.

Comptroller Knox to-day ordered an assessment of 100 per cent. upon the shareholders of the Mechanics National Bank, Newark, N. J., recently failed.

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.

The German ship Rudolph, from Antwerp to-day, brought the crew, eleven in number, of the barque Hattie M., from Dublin for St. John, abandoned in a sinking condition. The captain of the Hattie M. reports terrible weather. He lost three seamen overboard and a fourth was crippled.

The steamship Victoria from London, to-day, reports passing through an awful hurricane. On the 9th a heavy sea broke on board ship carrying overboard the boatswain and two seamen and injuring four men. The same sea stove No. 1 life boat, broke the main boom in three places, carried away three ventilators and damaged the funnel and rails.

BANGOR, Me., Nov. 16.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the European & North American Railway was held this afternoon. The following is a statement of the finances:—

Gross earnings, \$471,392.84. Gross income, \$477,937.11. Working expenses, \$398,168.31. Coupon interest paid, \$61,140. Leaving net income, \$18,628.80. Gain in gross income over 1880, \$69,611.05.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, 16. Nov.

Flags and triumphal arches have been erected in many places, to-day, at Rochdale, in honor of John Bright's 70th birthday. Congratulatory addresses have been presented to him.

Wm. Rathbone Greg, a well known political writer, is dead, aged 72 years. Alexander Mitchell Moir, merchant, has failed. Liabilities £61,000.

LIMERICK, Nov. 16.

The Sub-Commission Land Court here made the following reductions: Rent of £22 reduced to £24; rent of £40 to £25; rent of £45 to £28 10s.

LONDON, Nov. 16.

An explosion, supposed to have been of dynamite, occurred yesterday on board the Glasgow steamer Severn, from Bristol for Glasgow. The Severn was towed to Kingston Harbor. A portion of her decks was blown away. Nine persons were killed and several severely wounded; four were taken to hospital.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 16.

The Post says: "Princess Louise will accompany the Marquis of Lorne on his return to Canada five or six weeks hence. The Marquis will resign the Governor Generalship early in 1882."

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Nov. 16.

There were violent gales and heavy rains throughout the United States last evening, and shipping disasters occurred at Falmouth, Whitehaven and Berwick. The storm was especially severe on the west coast of Scotland.

DULUTH, MINN., Nov. 16.

The Clark House, the principal hotel in this city, was burned this afternoon. Loss \$50,000.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 16.

The extensive premises of Wm. Anderson have been destroyed by fire. Loss \$50,000.

ALEXANDRIA, Nov. 16.

The Sanitary Commission is informed

that 300 persons died of cholera in Mecca on the 6th inst. The epidemic has broken out at Djiddah.

LONDON, Nov. 16. A despatch from Rome says it is reported that the earthquake shocks at Messina, yesterday, caused some disasters and loss of life in the interior.

MORE LIGHT!
