MEETING AT FAIRFIELD.

The campaign for King's County opened at St. John's Hall on Thursday, when a large and representative meeting was addressed by Mr. A. C. McDonald, Dr. McIntyre and John McLean in the order named, and some others.

Mr. McDonald gave a full and interesting account of his stewardship for the past five years, upholding successfully the trade policy of the Government, and showing the success which attended his efforts, assisted by Mr. McLean, in favor of the branch railway to Elmira and other places.

Dr. McIntyre told the old thrash tale of combs, but did not attempt to show how a tariff for revenue only or free trade as it is in England was going to prevent people from combining for any purpose they may think proper. He ridiculed the idea of branch railways being built to Elmira by the Government, but failed to show that either he or his party would attempt anything of the kind.

Mr. McLean in a neat speech reviewed the questions of the day in a thoroughly convincing way.

The feeling along the north side and east is decidedly favorable to the Government candidate, Mr. McDonald, who not only holds his former vote, but finds many leading and intelligent electors who have been opposed to him in the past, now heartily in accord with him on the general policy of the Government and the railway branch to Elmira, seeing that the return of Mr. McDonald and the Government is the only possible chance the people of East Point have of obtaining a railway.

SIR CHARLES AVERTS A CRISIS. He becomes Personally Responsible for Money to Run the Printing Bureau.

OTTAWA, May 28.—Holy Thursday saw a crisis in the affairs of the Printing Bureau. It will be remembered that no supply was voted for the Bureau last session, and as there has been considerable extra work, the vote passed at the session of 1895 had become exhausted. This being so, Mr. McDougall, Auditor General, wrote Mr. Dawson, the Queen's Printer, pointing out that the vote being exhausted, there was no money left to pay wages, and that no cheques would, therefore, be issued on account of the Bureau. The letter was forwarded by the Dominion Police Postal Service, the ordinary mode of communication between the departments, and reached Mr. Dawson early Thursday afternoon. The Queen's Printer's position was an awkward one. There are 150 hands employed in the bureau, and a good deal of work yet to be done, but if the Auditor General refused to sign any more cheques the only alternative was to dismiss the whole force.

Anxious to avoid that if possible Mr. Dawson hurried at once to the Department of the Secretary of State, and was fortunate in catching Sir Charles Tupper just as he was leaving his office to catch the C. P. R. train for Montreal en route for the Maritime Provinces. The Auditor General's letter was handed to the Premier who hastily read it, and, as ever fertile in resource, made up his mind instantly as to the course he would pursue. He caused the railway authorities to be telephoned to that he might be a few minutes late and to hold the train. MEETING AT KINGSTON.

The candidates for East Queen's, A. A. McLean, C. Hon. D. Farquharson and Mr. Wm. Scott addressed a large and intelligent meeting of electors at Kingston on Friday night. Wm. Barrett, Esq., occupied the chair very acceptably.

Rev. L. H. Davies spoke first and repeated his views on the subject. Among the statements he made was one to the effect that from his knowledge of the country, as President of the Merchants' Bank of P. E. Island, business was never more depressed than it has been of late. He also said the Hudson Bay Railway would cost \$25,000,000!

Dr. J. T. Jenkins picked the speech (9) of the short-time leader to pieces. He pointed out that the proposed Hudson Bay Railway would only be 735 miles long, which, at the statutory subsidy of \$3,200 per mile, would cost Canada exactly \$7,717,500.

Hon. D. Farquharson responded to Mr. Davies' appeal to him, as a Director of the Bank of P. E. Island, to endorse his (Mr. Davies) statement respecting the state of P. E. Island business. Mr. Farquharson was only too glad to make the Merchants' Bank of P. E. Island a political machine, and endorsed the statement of Mr. Davies.
