IT is expected that the summer arrangement of trains on the I. C. R. will go into effect about the middle of June. The new time table will be made up on the 24 hour system.

MR. J. R. COFFIN has accepted the call to the congregation at Bloomfield, O'Leary and the Brae. The Presbytery will meet at Bloomfield on the 7th June, at 7 p. m., to hear his trials, and on the following morning at 10 o'clock for his ordination and induction.

THE Montreal conference of the Methodist church in session at Kingston, Ont., has adopted a strong resolution on the Scott Act, protesting against the mutilation of the Act, pledging the members to adopt all means to procure prohibition, declaring want of confidence in the senate on this question, and urging a union movement of all churches in Canada to procure prohibition.

DR. OLIVER WENDELL HOLMES has written the opening article for the "Beecher Memorial" now being prepared for Mrs. Beecher and her family by Mr. Edward W. Bok, of Brooklyn, N. Y., to which Mr. Gladstone, President Cleveland, the Duke of Argyll and some 75 other distinguished Americans and foreigners have also contributed articles. Only 100 copies of the "Memorial" are intended for the public.

ONE of the greatest American dramas, "The Danites" is now in rehearsal and will soon be produced under the auspices of the Oddfellows of this city. The plot of the play is said to be intensely interesting, and the incidents and situations picturesque and harmoniously worked up. Miss Agnes Cody has been especially engaged to play the leading part of "Billy Piper," a character in which she has won quite a reputation.

WE made some enquiries as to the contract under which the Electric Light Company light this city, and find that it is a very strict one, the Company having to pay 50 cents per night for every lamp out, and that the police report to the Council every lamp not lit or out during the hours required by the contract. It is upon this report that the Company are paid. It is open to the inspection of every citizen, who can check its accuracy in a moment, as every lamp is specially reported upon.

THE Canadian Pacific Railway Company carried out of Ottawa last year 75,000,000 feet of lumber, and the Canada Atlantic Railway about a similar amount, making the amount carried out of Ottawa by rail last year about 150,000,000 feet, out of a total cut of somewhat over 350,000,000 feet. Two-thirds of this amount shipped by rail went to the United States. The C. P. R. have secured several large contracts for carrying lumber from Ottawa to points in the United States this season.

ADVICES from Tignish are to the effect that a sixteen year old daughter of Mr. A. J. McFadyen, of Messrs. J. H. Myrick & Co., met with a painful accident on Sunday evening. It appears that on the evening in question Miss McFadyen went out for a short drive, but had not proceeded far when the horse took fright and ran away. In the course of the animal's flight the wagon collided with a tree and upset, and the occupant was thrown therefrom, coming in contact with another tree in her descent. She was severely hurt about the head and body, but it is pleasing to learn that her injuries are not so serious as were at first reported.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Mr. Dunn at the Bar.

OTTAWA, May 30. Returning Officer Dunn was called to the Bar of the House to-day. He entered a protest against the Parliamentary proceedings as illegal, and asked permission to be represented by counsel.

The Minister of Justice made a motion to that effect. Mr. Weldon (St. John) objected to counsel being allowed.

After considerable discussion, Mr. Edgar moved in amendment that Mr. Dunn be first examined, and after his answers were given he should be then allowed counsel to argue.

This amendment was lost by 119 to 43—a majority of 76.

Upon the main motion being put, only two members, Trow and Edwards, voted in the negative.

PULLMAN, Ill., May 30. Gaudaur won the race by four boat lengths. The official time was 19.30. The race was rowed almost from the start in a driving rain.

NEW YORK, May 30. The three mile single scull race between Wallace Ross and George Hosmer was rowed this afternoon. Ross won by two feet in 21.40.

WORCESTER, Mass., May 30. The three mile race between Ten Eyck and Laing was won easily by Ten Eyck in 20.41.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., May 30. A boiler on the elevator at the foot of Twentieth Street exploded to-day killing three men and badly injuring others.

She offered, if he would take his clothing away from their place of dwelling and agree to live away from her, that she would agree to support the children without asking for any contributions from their father. Duffield agreed to accept the release from his parental responsibility and the husbandly wife and mother will hereafter strain every nerve to support herself and her five helpless children.—Herald.

WE have received the report of the directors of the Liverpool, London and Globe Fire Insurance company presented at its fifty-first annual general meeting. The report states that the fire premium income for the year 1886 amounts to £1,289,594 sterling. The fire account, after providing for all losses and expenses, shows, without the addition of interest, a surplus of £205,130 sterling. The assets of this company, the largest fire insurance company in the world, on the 31st Dec. 1886, amounted to £7,817,852 19s. 11d. sterling, or upwards of \$38,000,000. The par value of the company's shares is £2 sterling, and we understand that they are now quoted in the London stock market at from £34 to £35 sterling each, or about seventeen hundred per cent. premium.
