## Bruins Not Down For Long; Habs Only 2 Games Ahead

BOSTON (AP)—Coach Bill Schmidt still burning over Boston Bruins' 1-0 defeat at the hands of Montreal Canadiens Tuesday night, hasn't lost any optimism about future games in the Stanley Cup playoffs.

Les Canadiens, winners of the cup twice in the previous four best-of-seven series. The third game will be at Boston Garden tonight with the fourth here Sunday.

Schmidt, battling centre for the Bruins famed Kraut line—points to his team's one goal in the two contests at Montreal.

"You can't hold down a club like ours for long," Schmidt said Wednesday.

"Montreal never was in the ball game, even if they did get that one goal. We beat ourselves in the net. We had plenty of chances. They threw their best at us, and got only one goal."

It was apparent the Bruins are going to have to take more shots. In the two games Boston connected on one of 45 drives at the net. Montreal tried 64 and scored six times.

Boston eliminated the National

Hockey League champion Detroit Club in five games by staying right with the free firing Red Wings. The Bruins hit on 15 of 129 shots while the Wings got 14 in 126.

Schmidt refused to shudder at the task of trying to win four of the next five games in order to beat Montreal.

"If this team was going to crack it would have done so after that first game. But they outplayed Canadiens by a country mile last night. If we don't beat them here I'll be very surprised."

Maurice "Red" Kelly scored four goals in that fifth game night it was Jean Beliveau on a solo against Boston rookie goalie Don Simmons that made the difference.

Boston whipped Detroit by bottling up super-stars Gordie Howe and Ted Lindsay, wingers on the same line, and attacker-defence-man Red Kelly.

Montreal has two brilliant lines, Beliveau-Bernie Geoffron - Bert Olmstead and Maurice Richard-Henri Richard-Dickie Moore, with scoring potential spilling over generously into the other alignments.

## Boston Bruins & Canadiens Play In Boston Tonight

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Canadiens leave Wednesday night for Boston and the third game of the Stanley Cup final carrying a big 2-0 lead and playing what coach Toe Blake calls "as good hockey as they have played all season."

"The boys finished out the regular season good as well as they ever did, and they had to do it to clinch second place," said Blake Wednesday. "So far through the playoffs they have kept up."

The teams meet Thursday and Sunday nights in Boston. Unless Canadiens pull off a sweep in Boston Garden, the clubs return to Montreal for a fifth game next Tuesday.

Blake's opinion that the club finished out the season in peak form and has not let down is borne out by the records.

Canadiens' last loss was March 17 a 2-1 defeat at the hands of Detroit Red Wings. They finished out the season with two wins, dropped only an overtime game to the Rangers and now, with two wins over Boston, have a playoff string of five straight wins.

But all five have been on Montreal ice and the highly geared Bruins are sure they can snap that victory run once they are back home.

In seven playoff games to date, made up of six wins and one loss, Canadiens have scored 28 goals, an average of four a game. With superb support from goalie Jacques Plante, they have given up only 13 goals, an average of 1.86.

**BRUINS BEEN WEAK**

The Bruins have been woefully weak in scoring so far in this series. They lost the first game 5-1 and then were blanked Tuesday night in the terrific struggle in which solid checking and defensive work predominated.

It may be ominous that the last two 1-0 games in a Stanley Cup final were won by Montreal. Canadiens defeated Detroit April 11, 1954, in Detroit on a goal by Ken Mosdell at 5:45 of the first overtime period.

The Bruins were the other victims. Elmer Lach scored at 1:23 of the first overtime period April 16, 1953. The game, in Montreal ended the series. Canadiens taking it four games to one.

The Bruins left immediately after the game. Coach Bill Schmidt said that despite their inability to score, he thought the Bruins were getting stronger and Canadiens weaker and that on the basis of the play his team should have won by two or three goals.

**BELIVEAU GOT GOAL**

Jean Beliveau supplied the goal in Montreal's 1-0 win Tuesday night, a game which Blake called "a great team effort."

"It was one of those stubborn defensive games, and we can play that type of hockey if forced to do it."

"I am not going to make any promises about winning this series in four straight. That would be crazy. Our fellows know what the Bruins did to us in the regular season—seven wins against our four, and four ties."

"They know, too, what the Bruins can do on their home ice. We won one game there during the season. But I'll say this: We are going to try to get the jump on Boston in Thursday's game. Our team is up for that game and, barring injuries, we can win it."

## Dalhousie Beats Sydney For Title

DALHOUSIE, N.S. (CP)—The powerful Dalhousie Rangers grabbed the Maritime Senior B. Hockey Crown Wednesday night by trouncing Sydney Millionaires 11-5 and taking the best-of-seven final in four straight.

The only previous time Dalhousie played Senior Hockey was in 1931, when it won the Maritime Title with such stars as Sammy McManus, Dud James and the late Bill Gulliver.

Four players led most of the Rangers' scoring. Tod Campeau, North Shore League Scoring Champion and a former Montreal Canadian, fired three past goalie Greg Floyd in the third period. Defenceman Clem Tremblay and forward Sam Gregory and Gratien Potvin shot two apiece.

Singles were tallied by Jack McLellan and playing coach Ray Le Duc.

Jim McLean led Sydney scoring, beating Nick Padosny twice. Phil Hunt, Kaufman and McNeill counted the others.

## Directors of Sunderland Football Club Suspended

LONDON (CP)—The Sunderland Football Club was fined £5,000 Wednesday and two of its directors were suspended for life for alleged unauthorized payments to players more than £15 a week.

Players also are allowed to receive only £10 when transferred between clubs, although the transfer fee paid between the clubs may amount to several thousand pounds.

The joint commission said club accounts showed £5,427 could not be accounted for in transactions extending over a five-year period.

The Football Association and the Football League also suspended two other directors "indefinitely" and censured four more. The joint commission said several players will be questioned about the illegal payments.

Suspended permanently from all football activity were Bill Ditchman, chairman of the first division club, and director William Martin. Vice-Chairman S. Ritson and L. W. Evans were suspended indefinitely.

The action followed an investigation into the affairs of the club. It started six weeks ago after the league received complaints of violation of league rules specifying that clubs are not allowed to pay

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP)—A two-stated slugger from Sydney, N.S., who has only spent two minutes and 11 seconds in the ring in six bouts, was the talk of the tournament Wednesday as the Canadian army boxing championships opened.

Clarence (Moon) Mollons, a chunky 174 1/2-pound 22-year-old, lived up to his advance reputation when he knocked out 17-year-old S. G. (Serge) Masson of St. Foy, Que., in a novice light-heavyweight encounter.

Mollons squared off in his corner as the bout began, threw a barrage of rights and lefts and after 11 seconds left Masson hanging from the ropes.

Mollons' victory highlighted a fine performance by prairie command boxers who won all five of their novice bouts.

The only defeat suffered by the boxers under Captain E. F. Carron of Chatham, Ont., and Sgt. C. E. Hardin of Victoria, was an 11-second light middleweight defeat handed Doug Rennie of Halifax, forced to retire in the second round of his bout against Dave Codville of Dunbar, B.C., one of western command's two defending champions.

The only other knockout in the 11 bouts of the afternoon came in the open light welterweight class when Harold MacGillivray of Trenton, N.S., representing eastern command, tagged Doug McNeil of Regina with a hard short right in the second round.

Search and rescue headquarters here said a Lancaster aircraft from Torbay, Nfld., would continue an overnight search over the Glenfield's normally would have followed.

Planes from Greenwood will join in the hunt at dawn Thursday.

A Kent Lines spokesman said Wednesday the Glenfield may have taken refuge from bad weather in a sheltered cove along its route.
