

Presentiments.

From an article by Rev. J. M. Buckley in the July Century on "Presentiments, Visions and Apparitions," we quote the following: "Since that experience, in many voyages I have made it an object to inquire of travelers and others concerning presentiments, and have found that they are very common, occasionally fulfilled, generally not so; and that it is the tendency with practically all persons who have had one presentiment come true to force themselves into all, and to become tyrants over those dependent upon them or those traveling with them. It is to be frankly admitted that no matter how vivid the supposed presentiment might be, its non-fulfillment would not demonstrate that there are no presentiments which must have originated external to the mind of the subject; but having been led by my experience to induce many persons to defy such feelings without a single instance of reported evil results, it confirms strongly the hypothesis of their subjective origin. "That presentiments are governed by no moral principle in the character of the subjects to which they are applied, the persons who receive them, the occasions upon which they are given, and their effects, is apparent. The most immoral has claimed to have them, have communicated them to others, and they have sometimes been fulfilled by events from which the persons having them have derived great personal advantages. The best of men have had presentiments, but the great majority of good people have not; and the greatest calamities which have befallen most persons have come without any warning whatsoever, except such as could be inferred from existing situations. Experience, foresight and guidance by ordinary sagacity have been all that mankind have had to rely upon; and to be governed on y by these combating or disregarding presentiments, impressions, and powerful impulses for which no foundation can be found in the nature of things, is the only safe and stable rule."

Success of British-American Steamers.

The Canadian Pacific line of steamers from Vancouver to Japan have now, says the Canadian Manufacturer, been running for a little over a year, and are completely cutting out the Pacific mail steamers under the United States flag which sail from San Francisco. The rates of freight are much the same, yet in the past tea season the Canadian Pacific steamers carried 5,357,944 pounds of Japan tea against only 735,265 pounds carried by their American rivals, and the curious circumstance is that more than nine-tenths of this tea is consumed in the United States. Not in tea only, but in all other goods, is the preference given to the Canadian line, which now carries a large part of the transcontinental traffic, as well as that destined for the United States. The journey to Vancouver is shorter, but this alone would not account for this wholesale transfer of trade.

Does Heating Milk Affect the Quality or Quantity of Butter.

Experimental studies of this question at Cornell University show the following results: First, that there is a loss of butter when the milk is allowed to cool much below the normal heat of the cow before being put in the creamer; second, that while there may not be any very great increase of butter when the milk is heated, there is no risk of injuring the quality of the butter by incorporating an excess of casein, even when the milk is heated as high as 135 degrees.
