Shoplifting By Teenagers Big Problem In Australia

Canadian Press Correspondent MELBOURNE (CP) — The trouble with Australian parents is they never say "no." This, says Victoria's chief policeman, is why many teen-agers finish up in police cells and courtrooms.

Just before Christmas is the worst time for teen-age trouble. The youngsters try to do each other with expensive Christmas presents to friends. They cannot afford to buy the presents they want, so they steal them. Theft from Australian stores cost millions of dollars a year. Much of the stealing is blamed on teen-age girls who believe they must have everything they want.

Chief Policewoman Grace Brebner said parents had failed to instill moral values such as honesty and integrity into their children. They had let them have everything they wanted.

THEFTS PLANNED Chief Brebner has been leading a campaign against teen-age crime in Victoria state. Making her report, she said girls, mainly of school age, made carefully planned raids on stores.

They met in groups and planned two or three days ahead to take a day off school and go into the city on stealing raids. So there would be no duplication, it was decided what each girl would steal and even details such as the color and size of garments to be taken were arranged.

Sometimes they would try on garments for size before stealing them. They even stole the paper bags to carry their loot away.

In the last six months, more than 100 teen-age girls have been arrested in Melbourne for shoplifting. The number caught is believed to be only a small proportion of the number of thieves.

When the girls took these expensive presents home parents were either afraid to ask where they came from—their daughters were so rebellious—or just didn't care.

One official estimated that shoplifting costs Melbourne stores \$1,000,000 in the 24 days before Christmas and more than \$10,000,000 in Victoria during the year.

A Melbourne judge believes teen-agers steal because they are spoiled by their parents and "corrupted" by the affluent society.

"Most young people have too much money," he said. "It ruins them."

"They want to dress like millionaires. These youngsters

IDA BAILEY ALLEN Budgetwise Pork Butts Divide To Conquer Cost

BY IDA BAILEY ALLEN Pork in all forms is becoming lower in price. A budgetwise buy is a smoked pork butt, which can be prepared and extended to serve for two dinners — an excellent example of "planned over" foods.

TOMORROW'S DINNER

Saladettes
Smoked Pork Butt Platter with Potatoes and Carrots
Lemon-Rice Pudding
Melted Jelly Sauce
Coffee, Tea, Milk

TWO DINNERS FROM ONE BONELESS SMOKED PORK BUTT

Order a 2 1/2 lb. smoked pork butt. Cover with cold water, bring to boiling point then drain off the water. Add 3 c. boiling water. Cover and simmer 2 hrs. or until fork-tender. Drain and save the liquid.

Cut the pork butt in half using this for our dinner. Refrigerate remaining half to use later in the week for a substantial pork and budget-priced cabbage chowder.

TO ARRANGE SMOKED PORK BUTT PLATTER

Use a sharp knife. Slice the half pork butt thin and arrange overlapping down the center of a good-sized platter. Border with parboiled potatoes and carrots cooked in tomato juice. Garnish: pickles.

SMOKED PORK BUTT CABBAGE CHOWDER

The reserved half smoked pork butt
4 c. liquid from the cooked smoked pork butt
4 c. fine-shredded cabbage
1/2 c. fine-chopped onion
1 tsp. cider vinegar
1/4 c. brown sugar
1/4 tsp. ground allspice
1 whole clove
1 (1 lb.) can juicy tomato
2 tsp. flour
2 tsp. cold water
Salt and pepper to taste
Caraway dumplings (recipe follows)
Garnish: minced parsley

To Prepare: Cut the reserved smoked pork into 1 1/4" cubes. Combine in a wide - top 3 1/2 qt. saucepan with the next eight ingredients. Cover and simmer 10 min.

Mix the flour with the cold water. Stir into the chowder and bring to a rapid boil. Add salt and pepper to taste. Drop the dumpling batter into the boiling chowder by half-tablespoons. Cover and slow-boil 15 min. without removing the cover. Ladle into deep soup

plates. Garnish with minced parsley.

CARAWAY DUMPLINGS: Make with biscuit mix following pkg. directions with this exception. Crush 1 tsp. caraway seed and add to the mix before stirring in the liquid.

LEMON RICE PUDDING

1 1/2 c. cooked white rice
1 egg, beaten
1/4 c. sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
3 c. milk
Juice and grated rind 1/2 lemon
Mix ingredients in the order given. Pour into a buttered or margarine 1 - qt. baking dish. Place in a pan. Pour in hot water to half the depth of the baking dish, and bake in mod. oven, 350 degrees F. until firm in the center, about 40 min. when tested with a pick. Serve warm or cold with melted jelly sauce.

CAUTION FROM THE CHEF

Whenever you cook a smoked pork butt, or smoked tongue, corned beef or any meat that is brined and smoked, first cover it with cold water. Heat gradually to draw out the excess salt; when boiling, drain thoroughly and proceed as the recipe directs.
