

Moving Day Nears For Post Office Department

Mr. J.J. Connolly, Charlottetown Postmaster let it be known that his department will move from the old Post Office Building the week ending October 6th, unless some unforeseen contingency arises which would change the plan. Mr. Connolly explained that the Post Office had dead-lined to meet; in other words mail to receive and dispatch at stated hours, and that the service would not admit of any delays. For this reason, the taking over of the new Post Office must be timed and carried out with precision and to a prepared plan.

Box-holders are already receiving notification of their new Post Office Box numbers, and also instructions about returning the keys of the old boxes. The new keys are being mailed to box-holders.

The Department of Transport,

Marine Branch, which has been awaiting the arrival of new furniture, plans to make the transfer to the Confederation Building next week, and will probably start moving furniture and equipment on Wednesday.

During the past few days, the Department of Veterans' Affairs including the personnel of the Veterans' Land Act Office, have taken over possession of the fourth floor of the new Building. Since the Department of Veterans' Affairs began operation about 10 years ago it has occupied the old Street and the Veterans' Land Act Office has been located on Kent Street in the Douglas Bros. and Jones Building. Both offices will now be on the one floor. Henceforth veterans who will have business to transact with the Department, will be able to do so without any stair climbing. The offices will

be reached by elevator. Whereas in the old building use was made of the basement, the ground floor and many offices were located on the second floor.

Cases Heard In Magistrate's Court

Rev. W. V. MacDonald, a native of Grand Tracadie, was ordained in June, 1917. He served as curate at St. Dunstan's Cathedral from 1917-21 at which time he was appointed parish priest at Hope River in 1937 he was transferred to Alberton as pastor and in 1941 became parish priest at Seven Mile Bay. He assumed charge at St. Peter's Bay in 1950.

Rev. George MacDonald was born at Tracadie. His ordination took place on June 24, 1930. He served as curate at the Basilica, Sturgeon, Tracadie and Iona before being appointed pastor at Brae and Lot 11 in 1933. In 1937 he was named parish priest at St. Margaret's.

Mathew MacLeod is a native of Fort Augustus parish. Following his ordination on June 20, 1948, he went to Summerside where he has served as curate until his present appointment.

Father Justin MacDonald was born in Grand River. He was elevated to the priesthood in 1952 and since that time has served as a member of the Basilica staff.

Father Hammill is a native of Lower Freetown. He also was ordained in 1952. He has been as-

stant at Seven Mile Bay since his ordination.

Father Sylvère Gallant was born in Egmont Bay. He has served as curate in several places since his ordination in 1949. They include: Vernon River, Cheticamp, N. S., Siskooka, Seven Mile Bay and St. Peter's Bay. For a short period he was assistant chaplain at the Charlottetown Hospital.

Father Denis Gallant was born at South Rustico. After ordination in 1951, he went to Tignish as curate, remaining there until departing for his music course in New York City.

Father Bradley, a native of Kelly's Cross, was ordained in June of this year. He has been relieving as curate at Tignish since that time.
