

International Control Of Suez Is "Matter Of Life"

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Eden said Wednesday night international control of the Suez Canal is a matter of life and death to all.

Eden went to Buckingham Palace to see the Queen and then appeared in a radio and television broadcast.

The prime minister said half the oil output of the Middle East passes through the 103-mile waterway and without it Britain, Western Europe and the Scandinavian countries could not survive.

Nobody should be surprised that Egypt's seizure of the canal had created a very grave situation.

AGAINST WORLD TREND

The whole trend of the world today is against taking selfish action for purely national ends," he said.

Eden's address was beamed throughout the world after he had given the Queen the latest situation report on the crisis which resulted in her royal proclamation declaring a state of national emergency.

The premier declared: "It (the Suez Canal) is the greatest international waterway

in the world and what (Egyptian President) Col. Nasser has just done is to seize it for his own ends."

AT HIS MERCY

Eden went on: "If Col. Nasser's action were to succeed, each one of us would be at the mercy of one man for the supplies upon which we live. We could never accept that."

For Britain the canal has always been the main artery to and from the Commonwealth bringing us the supplies we and they need."

Eden said Nasser had taken over an international company without consultation and without consent. The rights of the company were secured by repeated and solemn agreement entered into by the Egyptian government, the prime minister added.

Eden said some people had asked why Nasser could not be trusted to keep his promise not to interrupt shipping passing through the canal.

BAD RECORD

The answer is simple," he said. Look at his record. Our quarrel is not with Egypt and still less with the Arab world. It is

with Col. Nasser."

Eden said that instead of meeting Britain with friendship, Nasser had conducted a vicious propaganda campaign against this country. He has shown he is not the man to keep an agreement."

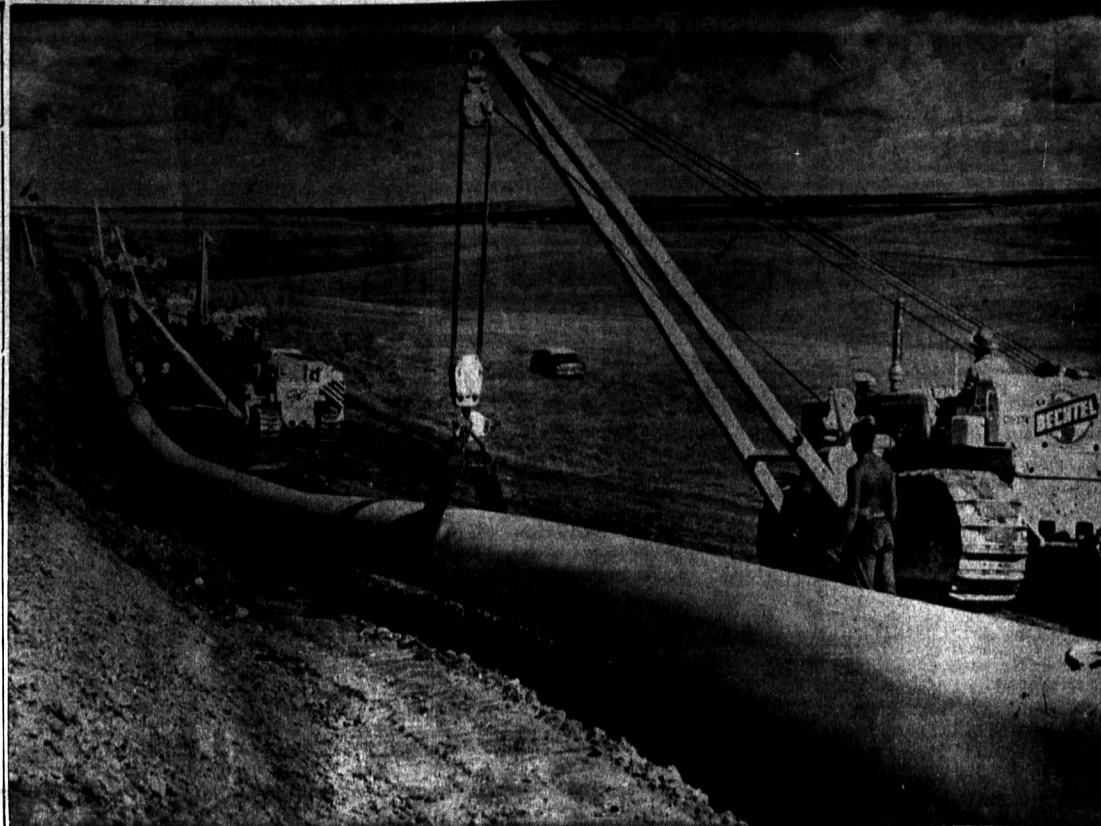
Just now Col. Nasser is soft peddling," Eden said.

His shouts are being modified. But how can we be sure?"

The prime minister said Britain did not seek a solution by force, but by the broadest possible international agreement. He said he was confident the London conference on the Suez Canal next week could produce a reasonable scheme for the future of the canal.

The prime minister added there was no question of denying Egypt a fair deal and just return.

He concluded: "We cannot agree that an act of plunder which threatens the livelihood of many nations should be allowed to succeed and we must make sure the life of the great trading nations of the world cannot in the future be strangled at any moment by some interruption to free passage of the canal."

Commander Of Hitler's Bodyguard Now On Trial

MUNICH (Reuters) — The former commander of Hitler's bodyguard, Sepp Dietrich, and former Nazi concentration camp chief Michael Lippert, have been charged with aiding and abetting the murder of Ernst Roehm and six other leading Nazi Brown-shirts in 1934, it was announced Wednesday.

The Bavarian justice ministry said the state prosecutor had filed charges after conducting an investigation since 1949 during which 800 witnesses were heard.

The prosecutor claims Dietrich announced Hitler's "death sentence" to the Brown-shirt victims.

ORDERED EXECUTIONS

He is alleged to have entered their cells in a Munich prison, where the Nazis kept them, and said: "The fuhrer has sentenced you to death—Heil Hitler."

Then he ordered the executions to take place, the prosecution claims.

In the case of Roehm himself, the charge claims, a revolver was "placed" in the cell and Roehm told to commit suicide within 10 minutes.

When he did not do so, the prosecution says, Lippert and another officer, now dead, entered the cell and the other officer fired twice at Roehm. Lippert added another bullet.

NEITHER UNDER ARREST

The justice ministry said Lippert was not charged with murder because the investigation failed to

Former Mate Of Bluenose Dies

TORONTO (CP) — Capt. Perry Edward Walters, 69, former first mate of Nova Scotia's famed racing schooner Bluenose, died in hospital here Wednesday.

Older brother of Capt. Angus Walters, the vessel's skipper, he had been a customs officer here for 20 years.

He was born in Lunenburg of the pioneer German stock who settled in the area in the 18th century. A deep-sea skipper in his own right, he joined the Bluenose at his brother's request when the fishing vessel became prominent in international racing.

He leaves his widow, two brothers, Capt. Angus of Lunenburg and Aubrey of Winthrop, Mass., and four sisters, Mrs. Florence Zinck, Toronto; Mrs. James Thurrow, Lunenburg; Mrs. William Knekle, Saskatoon; and Mrs. Charles Mann, New York.

Boat Missing Off Glace Bay

HALIFAX (CP)—RCAF search and rescue said that a Lancaster search plane from Torbay, Nfld., dispatched to attempt to locate a missing Glace Bay, N.S. fishing boat, with five aboard, was forced to return to base without success Wednesday because of fog.

The Western Glen, owned by Harry Lipkus and Son, reported late Wednesday it was disabled and taking water.

Another attempt will be made to locate the craft today.

Indicates Russia Will Accept Conference Bid

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Foreign Minister Dmitri Shepilov Wednesday was reported to have indicated Russia will accept the Western Big Three's invitation to a Suez Canal conference next week "with various reservations."

Shepilov gave this indication Tuesday at a meeting with British Ambassador Sir William Hayter and French Ambassador Maurice Dejean, diplomatic sources here said.

Shepilov told reporters Russia will reply within two days to the Western invitation to attend the London conference starting Aug. 14. The Western Powers have called the 24-nation conference to discuss international control measures for the Suez Canal, taken over by Egypt last month.

MAY POSTPONE TRIP

Shepilov also said the Soviet government had not received any notification of a change in the timing of Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser's projected visit

each nation toward freedom, economic independence and state sovereignty."

Other Soviet sources said, however, the attitude of Britain and France is causing the Russians grave concern. They said the Russians have come to the conclusion that a restraining influence should be brought to bear on the Western powers. The tone of the Soviet press recently has indicated strongly a belief that the United States and the Soviet Union are in the best position to apply the restraint.
