TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

A General Conference.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.

A call signed by many leaders of the various Protestant denominations, has been issued for a general conference of all the Evangelical Christians in the United States, under the auspices and direction of the Evangelical Alliance, in Washington Dec. 7th, 8th and 9th to study the following questions:

1st. What are the present perils and opportunities of the Christian Church and the country.

2nd. Can any of them be met best by a hearty co-operation of all Evangelical Christians, which, without detriment to any denominational interests, will serve the welfare of the whole Church?

3rd. What are the best means to secure such co-operation and awaken the whole Church to its responsibility?

The Presbyterian Synod.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., Oct. 4.

The Presbyterian Synod of the Maritime Provinces met at New Glasgow to-night. Retiring Moderator McLean preached an eloquent sermon on the love of Christ which passeth knowledge. Rev. E. A. McCurdy, of New Glasgow, was elected Moderator by a good majority over Rev. J. M. MacLeod, of Charlottetown. The new Moderator, in his inaugural address, reviewed the progress of the Church during the twenty years since his ordination. About 250 ministers are in attendance.

A Propellor Lost.

TORONTO, Oct. 4.

The propellor California has been lost at Mackinaw. She was owned by Orange & Gaddis, of this city, and was insured at \$30,000, and was fully insured. She had a cargo of grain and pork from Chicago for Montreal. Ten people are yet unaccounted for and are believed to be lost. Despatches to-night report a large number of disasters on Lake Huron, but particulars have not yet been received.

The Mitchellstown Riot.

LONDON, Oct. 4.

During the inquest to-day into the cause of the victims shot by the police at Mitchellstown, Harrington caused a scene by openly declaring that the police who testified committed perjury. Head constable Browning declared he valued the lives of the police more than the lives of the rioters.

The R. R. V. Railway Injunction.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 4.

Judgment was given to-day in the Browning injunction in re the Red River Valley Railway, in favor of the Province.
