Town Planning Steps Detailed At Kensington

KENSINGTON — In an effort to maintain standard housing conditions surrounding the town, the Kensington District Board of Trade called a special meeting last Thursday evening, which was addressed by Claude Smith, director of town planning. Wendell MacKay, deputy minister of municipal affairs, also attended.

Mr. Smith in his address, noted a number of unsightly objects which tend to ruin the view from the highways throughout the province, such as dilapidated and abandoned shales and gravel pits and litter dumped with sight of the road. However, in 1950, laws were made to govern roads outside town limits. These laws were already taken advantage of the town planning service operating under this law.

Mr. Smith named three communities, Wilmet, Lunklester and Sherbrooke, which have taken advantage of this service. Under the Town Planning Act a permit must be obtained for persons wishing to construct or relocate a building. Specifications must be submitted. Standard roofing and walls are a requirement, and buildings must be recessed at least 50 feet from the centre of the road and 15 feet from a neighbor's line.

The speaker stated that a school district can set up a community improvement committee. In this committee application forms are left with the secretary. When a province wishes to construct or relocate a building, he fills out the application and if the committee recommends approval of the application, it is sent to the department of municipal affairs for a building permit.

NEEDS SUPPORT
The speaker stressed, "Community planning requires the support of everyone in the community and it is an area that goes on more people will want to make their communities as attractive as possible."

In the discussion which followed it was pointed out by Mr. Smith and Mr. MacKay that the school district itself must set up a community improvement committee before regulations can be brought into effect for the community. Neither the minister of municipal affairs nor the district authority over any school district until a committee of six has been removed to enter into agreements on behalf of the province with the school districts.
