Youth Charged In Hit And Run Highway Death

Donald Keith Higgins, 16, of Stanhope, was charged Tuesday before Queens County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, with criminal negligence causing death, in connection with the highway deaths of Duncan Albus MacInnis of Sydney, N.S. MacInnis died at East Royalty on St. Peter's Highway near midnight June 27 or 28.
