Yanks Boot One To Tribe; Bosox Dump Chicago 7-5

A glaring error by Mickey Mantle and a bad throw by Tom Morgan presented Cleveland with an unearned, tie-breaking run in the ninth inning for a 6-5 victory over New York Yankees in an American League game in New York Wednesday.

In Boston, meanwhile, the Red Sox defeated Chicago 7-5 for their third victory in seven games on rookie Dave Sisler's brilliant relief pitching and a tie-dissolving three-run inning.

Herb Score, who was unable to beat the Yankees in four tries last year, received credit for the Cleveland victory but it took a strong relief job by Don Mossi, another pitcher, to assure his triumph.

Mossie, who pitched the ninth after Score had given up nine hits, started off inauspiciously when Mantle greeted him with a line single, the Yankee thumper's third hit. The game relief act then snuffed out the hopes of the Yankees by striking out Yogi Berra and Bill Skowron and retiring Gila McDougald on a soft fly.

NEW YORK (AP)—Floyd Patterson and Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson were matched Wednesday for a 12-round heavyweight bout at Madison Square Garden June 8 as part of the elimination to determine a successor to heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano.

The match was announced in the offices of Julius Helfand, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, who said each fighter will get 25 per cent of the gate or a minimum guarantee of \$20,000 plus \$20,000 each for radio and television.

Soccer Player Breaks Neck

MANCHESTER, Eng. (Reuters)—Bert Trautmann, Manchester City's brilliant German-born goalkeeper, broke his neck in helping his side win the Football Association Cup at Wembley Saturday, a hospital x-ray revealed Wednesday.

Trautmann, a wartime German paratrooper who chose to live in England after being a prisoner of war, was kicked on the neck in the closing minutes of the cup final when he dove at the feet of a Birmingham forward. Later his injury was aggravated when he collided with the Manchester City centre-half Dave Ewing.

Trautmann, England's "footballer of the year," played in a daze for the last 15 minutes, and was rubbing his neck when he went up to receive his cup winners medal from Queen Elizabeth.

Trautmann is reported to be comfortable and resting quietly. Walter Griffiths, Manchester City secretary, said: "The news has come as a great shock to us but we are hoping that he will be fit to play next season."

Move To Avert Shipping Strike

OTTAWA (CP)—Labor Minister Gregg announced Wednesday he has appointed Montreal lawyer H. Carl Goldenberg as mediator in a strike threatening a wide dispute between Great Lakes seamen and shipping companies.

He said Mr. Goldenberg will begin mediation attempts immediately with the Seafarers International Union and the Association of Lake Carriers in an effort to head off a strike scheduled for today.

In Montreal, the association and the union said they have agreed to meet with the mediator in an attempt to avert the strike.

Bob Baker Gets Nod In 12-Rounder

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Big Bob Baker drew first blood in the scramble for the vacant heavyweight throne Wednesday night as he stashed his way to a unanimous 12-round decision over John Holman in the Miami Beach auditorium.

Baker, the Pittsburgh giant who has been plagued by brittle hands through much of his boxing career, opened a gash over Holman's left eye in the sixth round and the blood flowed freely over Holman's face as Baker pounded him almost at will in the late rounds.

Holman, the slow-motion Chicagoan who throws a good punch but has difficulty making it land on a good boxer, was a futile figure after the ninth round as he plodded forward in an effort to land a blow that could turn the tide.

Reserve Air Space Aims At Safety

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government has created a reserved air space along all designated Canadian airways in a move to make the air safer for commercial and military aircraft.

Transport Minister Marler said Wednesday the step has been taken to make it easier for his department to handle future rapid growth of air traffic in a safe and expeditious manner.

Under a new air navigation order all aircraft flying on Canada's 20,000 miles of designated airways must maintain minimum and maximum altitudes at all times. The order will be administered by the Canadian Air Traffic Control organization.

Can. Prairies Birthplace Of Horse Racing Starting Bar

EDMONTON (CP)—The Canadian Prairies, where the horse-race starting gate was first introduced in North America, is the birthplace of the starting bar, latest gadget to sweep the continent's tracks.

The starting bar is a surface device to give horses solid footing for a fast getaway and was first used in an experiment at Victoria Park in Calgary. Its inventor is George Dunn, starter on Prairie tracks.

Introduced on California tracks during the winter, the starting bar now is gaining tribute in New York and Maryland. It may be adopted at all up-to-date tracks as an essential part of starting equipment.

The starting bar is being hailed as the finest gate innovation since closed stall gates were introduced. The starting gate, now used at all tracks, was first tried out in North America when used in Winnipeg in 1939.

FIRM THRUST
The bar is a steel strip covered with hard rubber. It is half sunk into the ground a few inches behind where the horses' hind feet normally rest while in a starting gate.

Sugar Ray Robinson Angry Over Eight-Ounce Glove Rule

LOS ANGELES (AP)—World middleweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson Wednesday issued hot words of disfavor on the California rule which dictates that he and Bobo Olson must wear eight-ounce gloves in their championship fight at Wrigley field on the evening of May 18.

There was even talk of a walk-out from the champ's managers, Ernie Braca and George Gainford, unless the rule is changed.

But Jack Leonard, who is promoting the 15-round, nationally televised match for the Hollywood Legion stadium, took the news calmly.

Puffing quietly on a large cigar, Leonard predicted: "This makes good reading but I am of the firm opinion Robinson will be in the ring a week from Friday. He likes money, too."

The rule says fighters weighing over 147 pounds must use eight-ounce gloves. It would take an act of the legislature to change it. The legislature is not about to call a special session on the matter.

Said Gainford: "The Marquis of Queensbury rules state that all championship fights be fought with six ounce gloves. We will go by those rules."
