An Ounce Of Prevention Counts For Much Safety

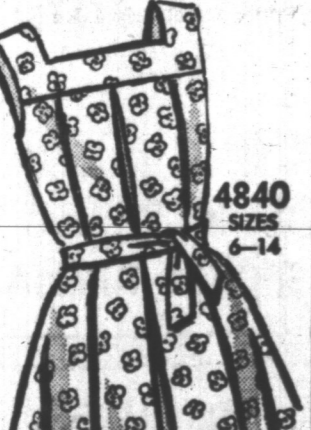

Nut meats vary menus. Pecans, filberts, walnuts, and other nut meats add flavor, protein calories and a luxury touch to everyday foods. For example: Roll patties of mashed white or sweet potatoes in chopped nut meats before sauteing. Add 1/4 the quantity of fine-chopped nut meats to fine dry crumbs when coating chicken or fish filets to fry. Stir 1-3 c. nut meats chopped coarse into the recipe for baking powder biscuit dough. Strew coarse-chopped nut meats into a tossed salad or stir in when making jellied fruits.

I am in love with Nell, who lives in the suburbs with her sister, a divorcee, and their widowed mother. Over the New Year's weekend, Nell's family had two bachelor house guests. Bob is a family cousin; Jeff is his apartment-mate. The cousins hadn't seen each other for years. The sisters and the bachelors had a wonderful time, enjoying a country life routine.

Perhaps I'm old-fashioned, also a bit jealous. But when I heard that the sisters and their guests were attired in pajamas and robes for breakfast together, I objected, mainly as the second man is an outsider to the family. So much for preface. Now Bob has invited the sisters in town to discuss family insurance and to stay overnight at his apartment, as it is an hour-and-a-half trip from their home.
