Would Deny Soil To Air Force Units

BAGDAD, Iraq, Oct. 11 (Reuters)—Iraq seeks revision of the treaty under which Britain is allowed to station air force units of Iraqi soil, an official statement said tonight.

Premier Nuri Es Said made the request last month while he was in London. The announcement said the Premier would take no action before seeking the advice of leading Iraqi statesmen.

Would Declare War

CAIRO, Egypt, Oct. 11 (AP)—Several thousand members of the Moslem Brotherhood of Egypt demanded tonight that Egypt issue a declaration of a state of war with Britain.

Seek Independence

KHARTOUM, Sudan, Oct. 11 (AP)—The Independence Party said today it would demand Sudan's independence the moment Egypt formally abrogates her 1936 treaty with Britain. The party, which Egypt threatens to wipe out, calls for joint British-Egyptian control of the Sudan.

Ming Sung Co. Defaults On Canadian Loan

OTTAWA, Oct. 11 (CP)—The Ming Sung Co. of China has defaulted on the initial payment of a \$1,275,000 loan backed by the Canadian Government, it was learned today.

Smuggling May Force Cut In Cigaret Prices

MONTREAL, Oct. 11 (CP)—Canadian tobacco retailers, worried by increased smuggling of American cigarettes, are considering lowering the price of Canadian-produced cigarettes and absorbing the cut in profit themselves.

The Montreal retailers canvassed by the Canadian Press said today they are waiting first to see the result of expected Federal legislation eliminating fixing of retail prices.

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Britain, Australia Sign Meat Agreement

LONDON, Oct. 11 (Reuters)—A 15-year meat agreement was signed here tonight between Britain and Australia. Details will be announced tomorrow. Negotiations were based on the British wish to buy all Australia's surplus meat for the next 15 years.

CHERBOURG, France, Oct. 11 (Reuters)—Lt.-Gen. Guy Simmonds, Canadian chief of staff, arrived here today on the liner Queen Mary. He described his trip as a military mission and said he will meet Gen. Eisenhower, commander of Atlantic Pact forces in Europe.

U. S. and French Troops Take Final Peak

U. S. EIGHTH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Oct. 12 (Friday) (AP)—U. S. and French troops today overwhelmed the last hold-out peak on "Heartbreak Ridge" in the greatest combined assault in a month of heavy fighting in Eastern Korea.

The height dominated a Communist supply route on the eastern front and the Reds had fought doggedly to hold it. But tank-infantry assaults and furious artillery barrages smashed the Communists in their positions, field reports said.

Then the infantry in a night attack swept the last Red defender from the summit.

Thursday the U. S. and French troops fought up the slopes of the ridge, roughly 25 miles north of the 38th parallel, only to be stopped after advancing but 40 yards.

North Koreans with Chinese Communist reinforcements held back that onslaught with hand grenades, machine-guns, mortars and artillery.

But with more than 50 Allied tanks ranging to the rear and shooting up support areas, the Communist positions became untenable.

East of Heartbreak, the marines moved nearly 1,000 men to the front Thursday by helicopter.

The light for Heartbreak's final peak began late Thursday after twin tank columns had completed their second straight day of pounding the height.

The American and French troops moved along an exposed trail up the ridge from the south. Communist mortar and artillery fire rained down on them.

They split just below the crest. The Americans attacked the peak from the west, the French from the east.

The United Nations troops, with grenades and cold steel, gouged the Reds out of bunkers in bitter, hand-to-hand fighting and sent the remnants fleeing to the north.

New Delay Crops Up In Truce Talks

MUNSAN, Korea, Oct. 12 (Friday) (AP)—A dispute over where to draw a neutral zone threatened further delay today in resumption of Korean truce talks.

Allied and Communist liaison officers were scheduled to meet again, however, at 10 a. m. (8 p. m. EST Thursday) and there was a possibility that they might agree.

The Peiping radio said that at the two liaison sessions Thursday near Panmunjom, the Reds proposed immediate resumption of conferences by the full delegations at 1 p. m. today.

The Red broadcast said the Allied team refused because "The U. N. liaison officers are still insisting to negotiate the scope of the neutral zone."

To reduce the possibility of neutrality violations, such as the Reds charged in breaking off the truce talks at Kaesong Aug. 23, Gen. Matthew Ridgway proposed the zone be confined to a small area around the new meeting site.

The Reds suggested a large neutral zone, including not only the Panmunjon area but Kaesong and the Allied camp at Munsan.

Hamilton Merchants Slash Prices On Some Lines Of Merchandise

HAMILTON, Oct. 11 (CP)—Some Hamilton merchants today announced sharp reductions in merchandise usually sold at prices fixed by the manufacturer.

The move followed the announcement in the Speech from the Throne at the opening of Parliament Tuesday that the Government plans legislation forbidding manufacturers to fix the retail prices of their products.

In a half-page newspaper advertisement, Right House, a large department store which also has an outlet in Brantford, Ont., announced price reductions in a long list of price-fixed merchandise. The advertisement said the store was breaking an agreement with manufacturers. Smaller ads by other retailers did not refer to price-fixing, merely announcing mark-downs on certain merchandise.

Some merchandise on which prices were reduced is manufactured by the General Electric Company. But G. E. in Toronto said it had made no price reductions on any of its products and knew nothing of the retailers' cuts in Hamilton.

Several Toronto retailers said they did not plan any price cuts.

The advertisement state that there will be no more fixed prices.

Some merchants had announced sharp reductions in merchandise usually sold at prices fixed by the manufacturer. These reductions followed announcement by the Government in the Speech from the Throne Tuesday that it plans to outlaw such price fixing.

Princess Leaves Ottawa Hairdresser Breathless

OTTAWA, Oct. 11 (CP)—Harvey Delorme got closer to Princess Elizabeth today than perhaps any other Canadian.

And he saw her let her hair down, then helped her to put it up again.

The 34-year-old beauty parlor operator was summoned to Government House this morning to do the royal tresses for today's events on the royal visit here.

When the 90-minute hair-dressing session was over, the breathless Mr. Delorme told reporters: "She was very, very nice. She was very friendly. She was charming."

He said the Princess asked him scores of questions about his health and she replied: "The King is really getting along fine and is much better."

Of the Princess herself, Mr. Delorme said her skin is "beautiful."

"I had a good chance to see it, of course, and it is flawless. Her skin is so beautiful as to seem transparent."

As to her hair, "it is very good. It is an extremely light brown, but it is not blonde. It has a very nice texture. She also has a natural wave of her own."

"She had a permanent before she left, but this was just at the ends of her hair," he said. And the royal figure, Mr. Delorme said, is "very dainty."

Potato Crop Prospects Now Much Brighter

While great caution should still be exercised by potato producers in order to prevent mechanical injury, the situation has been saved by the ten day waiting period and the careful handling to date, Mr. C. E. Shaw, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Fruit and Vegetable Division, said yesterday.

Field inspectors report that in some areas the crops are good, and producers generally have needed the warnings issued regarding the need for care both in digging and picking, with a resultant increase in returns for a higher quality product. September shipments by rail, water and truck were equal to about 41 carloads, and total shipments for the season up to October 1st were equivalent to over 100 carloads.

The shipments of turnips for September totalled about 65 carloads, and the turnips were described as very nice in form by Mr. Shaw. Although some areas report that the crop has been damaged by turnip maggot, the situation on the whole is not believed to be any worse than last year.
