

MCA Team Wins P.E.I. 5-Pin Bowling Ch'ship In Keen Competition

The Maritime Central Airways bowling team displayed top form yesterday to win the Prince Edward Island Five Pin Bowling Championship and with it the Reliance Garage Trophy against strong and very keen competition at the Roll-Away Alley.

The Airways bowlers lost only two points during the marathon which concluded shortly before one o'clock this morning. Their score for the day read 30 points in the won column against two in the loss bracket.

George's Boys from Summerside were runners-up with the strong score of 27 points in the won against five. Horne's Rockets were third and S. R. Johnston's Monarchs fourth.

The Loyola Puffs of the Monarchs won the Michael Ross Trophy for high single with a score of 415. Glen Matheson came close to capturing this honor in the last match of the day as he rolled a single game of 411.

The Puffs, who had an outstanding day also took the trophy for the high average with an average score of 268.9. This trophy was donated by the Roll-Away.

Joy Macdonald with 268.2 gave Dr. Duffy a close run in the high average department. Glen Matheson had third high with 264.9 and Earl Smith of Summerside fourth with 263.8.

Matheson, who was among the leaders in every department, won the Larter's Barber Trophy for high three with a score of 974. He won it in the last match as he put together scores of 288, 411 and 275.

Suder and Abrams Are Current Surprises In Major League Batting

NEW YORK, (AP)—Although their teams are firmly entrenched in the second division, Pete Suder of Philadelphia Athletics and Pittsburgh's Cal Abrams are the current surprises in major league batting circles.

Suder, 30-year-old second-baseman, is hitting a robust 370, record in the American League to George Kell's 402. Boston's brilliant third-sacker has led the junior circuit since May 3.

Abrams, with a .351 mark, is a solid fourth in the National League behind co-leader Roy Campanella of Brooklyn and Philadelphia's Johnny Wyrostek, each with .370 and Jim Greenagard of Cincinnati with .360. Records include Sunday's games.

Suder, in his 11th season with the A's, is on an eight-game batting streak. He picked up 16 points last night at bat. But what accentuates his form reversal this year is his lowly .249 lifetime average and his 1952 mark of .241 in 74 games.

Similarly, Abrams had only a "fair" grading as a batsman until this season. But the Pirates outfielder has been one of the few bright spots for the seventh-place Bucs. He has 26 hits in 74 at bats, including three home runs.

Behind Kell and Suder in the American League come Sherm Lollar, Chicago 346; Al Rosen, Cleveland 347; and Mickey Vernon, Washington 336.

Max Surkont, veteran Milwaukee right-hander, paces the National League pitchers with five victories and no defeats and southpaw Mel Parnell of Boston Red Sox tops the American with a 4-0 slate.

Monte Irvin Wallops Homer As Giants Score 8-6 Win Over Cardinals

The National League got a forcible reminder Monday that you can't sell New York Giants short as long as Monte Irvin is in their lineup.

Irvin, starting his third full year with Leo Durocher's club, has shown a consistent ability to take charge when things get rough. Two years ago he hauled the New Yorkers up by their bootstraps to a driving finish that won them a pennant. Last year he suffered a broken leg in mid-season and the Giants gave up the ghost.

Currently Monte is playing for a second-division club—just like the 1950 outfit before they began their stretch drive. And his performance Monday was an echo of what happened then.

The Giants were tied with the St. Louis Cardinals 5-4 after blowing an early lead when Irvin came to bat in the seventh inning with two mates and walloped one of Alpha Buzze's pitches into the stands for his sixth homer of the year. The New Yorkers went on to win 8-6.

In the American League Detroit Tigers split a twin bill with Boston Red Sox. Ned Garver limited Boston to five hits as the Tigers won the opener 5-2, but the last-placers never caught up in the afterpiece when the Sox scored six runs in the first inning. The victory was the fifth of the season against no defeats for lefty Mel Parnell.

New York K.O. Artist May Fight Poulton

Johnny Pruitt, the New York middleweight who was scheduled to meet Harry Poulton on June 8, has been called in as a substitute on a New York fight card around that date and will be unable to appear in Charlottetown. Ivan Docherty of the Boosters Club and Islanders executive was informed yesterday.

However, Pruitt's place may be taken by a more capable New York fighter in the person of Gil Edwards. Both Pruitt and Edwards are managed by Bobby Gleason and Edwards will be available for a fight early in June.

Edwards, who has an outstanding record of success in the ring, comes more highly priced, an Pruitt and there is a matter of financial adjustment to be made before negotiations for an Edwards Poulton fight are completed.

The hard-hitting Edwards had seven knock-outs to his credit last year and fought in several main bouts in New York. If he accepts the terms offered by promoter Docherty fight fans will have a chance to see one of the most talented performers ever to step inside an Island ring. He weighs 160 pounds.

He comes from a very highly regarded fight stable. Another fighter managed by Bobby Gleason is Orlando Zulueta who won a Paddy Demarco last year. Zulueta defeated Kid Howard in Halifax a year ago.

Poulton is already in Halifax training at the Stadacona Gymnasium for the coming fight. Among those with whom he is working out are "Duck" Trainor of Charlottetown and Percy Prator of New Glasgow.

McGovern-Cantor Fight To Draw

BIRMINGHAM, (Reuters)—Former British lightweight champ Tommy McGovern and Solly Cantor of Toronto fought to a draw here Monday night. McGovern weighed 136, Cantor 137.

McGovern suffered a cut over the left eye in the third round of the eight-round bout and Cantor's left eye was cut in the seventh but neither was seriously handicapped.

Cantor scored repeatedly with swift left jabs but McGovern got his own back with solid right hooks to the side of the head.

City Hockey Star Returns



Orin Carver (above) the young Charlottetown junior hockey star who played with the Memorial Cup winning Barrie Flyers, will return to his home here this evening after concluding a most outstanding hockey season.

Carver who is the only Island-born hockey player ever to play with a Canadian junior hockey championship team, is pictured above with the Memorial Cup and the Eastern Canadian Junior Trophy. That's the Memorial Cup in his right hand.

To say that Carver had a successful season might be something of an understatement. He opened the season at the Halifax St. Mary's training camp and was shortly afterwards purchased by "Happy" Emms of the Barrie Flyers.

Orin has an immediate hit with the Memorial Cup-bound Flyers. On his first appearance with Barrie he stole the spotlight as the Flyers eked to a 6-3 win over Kitchener Greenhirts. At the conclusion of the game he won the "Star of the Night Award."

Following is a report of what a Barrie sports reporter had to say the day after he had seen Carver in his first game: "His name couldn't even be found in small print throughout pre-game information; he wasn't even listed in the program lineup but, before Barrie Flyers had finished rapping Kitchener Greenhirts 6-3 Wednesday night over 1,700 patrons knew coach 'Happy' Emms had uncovered a valuable piece of property.

"An unheralded newcomer to the club, Orin Carver, obtained from Halifax St. Mary's of the Maritime Junior 'A' circuit, stole a spotlight that was supposed to be dominated by Gilles Boisvert, recently acquired netminder from Montreal Junior Canadiens, here on tour.

"Boisvert, along with new left-winger Jimmy Robertson had received all the 'ink' and were naturally chief targets for the public. And out of the dark rose Carver whose play on the right-wing boards earned him the tab 'Star of the Night' over such standouts and crowd favorites as Don McKenney, Greenhirts' four-point spread, his best scoring night since the opener here against Galt Black Hawks.

"Carver so impressed coach 'Happy' Emms, who was more surprised than anyone, that he received work in killing penalties and even got in on power plays. 'I like a kid who doesn't quit trying,' commented Emms, 'and Carver showed that kind of spirit tonight. If he keeps that up he'll help us plenty.'

"Since that opening night there have been many outstanding displays by Carver. As Emms observed he is a spirited, hard working hockey player who plays his best when the going is hardest.

"Orin contributed much to the success of the Flyers throughout the season. He collected his share of the points and he was an excellent penalty killer.

"The young fellow who rose to hockey fame this season began his career with the West Kent School team. He later played with the Midget Abbies when that team won the Maritime Championship. Orin performed on a line with Lal Hennessy and Keith Dalziel.

"After that it was year of juvenile hockey and then to Halifax for two successful seasons with

Davis Cup Play

OSLO, (AP)—Britain qualified for the third round of European zone Davis Cup tennis play Monday by winning the deciding doubles match to lead Norway 3-0 in the second round.

Britain's Tony Mottram and Geoff Parish defeated Rolf Paue and Nils Erik Hensen, 7-5, 6-0, 6-0. Britain will meet Belgium, winner over Hungary, in the third round, which must be completed by July 14.

Five other countries — France, Germany, Sweden, Italy and The Philippines — qualified for the third round during the week-end.

France lost only one match in eliminating Yugoslavia; the Philippines won 5-0 over Finland; 3-2; Sweden swept all five matches from Spain; Italy routed The Netherlands 5-0 and Belgium swept its matches with Hungary.

Tennis Tour To Start At Halifax

HALIFAX, (CP)—Jack Kramers' touring professional tennis quartet will start an east-to-west tour of Canada in Halifax June 19.

Kramer, Frank Sedgman, Pancho Segura and Ken McGregor will complete the coast-to-coast jaunt in British Columbia later in the summer.

Whether the tour will include other centres in the Maritimes is not known as yet.

U. S., Russian Chess Tourney This Summer

NEW YORK, (AP)—Russians and American are going to try to settle one international problem this summer at the chess board.

The U.S. Chess Federation has received word that its formal invitation for a match with the Russians, sent behind the Iron Curtain in January, has been accepted.

A 10-man squad of comrade masters is all ready for a go here at settling the recurrent debate that flares in chess circles over whether Soviet players really are better than anyone else.

There still are a couple of ifs to be cleared up, however, before the boards can be set up for battle.

Harold M. Phillips, president of the American group, said Monday the Russians want to play June 10-18, but he is trying to get the starting date set for July 27.

Efforts have been under way since 1946 for a tilt between the two countries.

The Olympics at Helsinki last year didn't settle too much. The four-man teams of the two countries played a 2-2 standoff in the Helsinki finals, but the U.S. squad wound up fifth in the overall pawn-pushing among 18 nations. Russia, playing without world champion Mikhail Botvinnik, was first.

Botvinnik is all set to lead the team that is to compete in New York.

Each player will have four games with his opposite in the rankings. And just to be sure no one is rushed, two days are planned for each game.

Athletic Commission Rejects Jersey Joe's Protest Of Title Bout

CHICAGO, (AP)—The Illinois athletic commission, voicing disappointment at Jersey Joe Walcott's showing against Rocky Marciano and urging his retirement, rejected a protest of the fight by the aged ex-championship manager Monday.

There was little drama at the commission's hearing as chairman Livingston Osborne ruled that Marciano's knockout of Walcott in Chicago Stadium Friday night "stands as official" and all five points of a written protest are "disallowed."

Unless Felix Boechchio, Walcott's manager, and his attorney, Angelo Malandra, decide to seek legal action against the decision in the courts, the case is closed.

Both men attended a special showing of three-dimensional films of the heavyweight title bout prior to the hearing, and charged they had been edited. Boechchio then went to Chicago Stadium and picked up a cheque from the International Boxing Club for \$250,000 as Walcott's guarantee, before appearing at the commission with Malandra.

Then commission member Lou Ruzenda declared: "I don't think boxing deserves this kind of nonsense from Boechchio. I am sure Boechchio is a very competent manager and will discuss with Walcott about a diminished retirement during the next 30 days (the automatic period in Illinois that a fighter who has lost by a knockout can return to the ring)."

Malandra said he and his client were undecided whether to carry their protest into the courts.

"We'll talk it over with Walcott and see if he would like legal action," Malandra said. "We could carry it into any district court for disposal, probably in New Jersey where Joe lives or in Illinois."

At the protest meeting, Osborne praised Walcott—who insists he is 39—as a one-time great fighter and then added: "I think Walcott was through when he went into the ring and I was very disappointed in his performance. He should retire."

Boechchio and Malandra took this without batting an eye.

The moving pictures shown conclusively that Walcott stirred only slightly at the audible count of 10 and then arose some what wobbly, after being waved out by referee Frank Sikora.

In slow motion and conventional speed they showed that Rocky's kayo punch in 2:25 of the first round was a left hook partially blocked, followed by a combination right cross-uppercut sort of blow to the chin.
