

Old Foes Face Off In Memorial Play Tonight

TORONTO (CP)—Old foes face off tonight in the first game of the Canadian junior hockey championships.

Toronto Marlboros, who won their first Memorial Cup in 29 years at Regina last spring, again meet the same Regina Pats of the 1956 title.

Marlies go into the best-of-seven finals fresh from Wednesday night's thrilling 2-0 victory over Montreal Junior Canadiens, winning them the eastern title and the George Richardson Memorial Trophy.

The Pats, who defeated Port Arthur 5-4 in overtime in the seventh and deciding game of the western series, however, have not played since their series ended nearly two weeks ago.

Coach Turk Broda called his squad's victory over Montreal "the greatest team effort I've ever seen."

"I thought we beat the best junior team in Canada," he said, "and now we go right back against another team that will be just as tough."

Bower Named Most Valuable Player In A.L.

NEW YORK (AP)—Goalie Johnny Bower of Providence Reds was named Thursday as the most valuable player of the American Hockey League for the 1955-56 season.

Bower, 30-year-old native of Prince Albert, Sask., is the first goaltender to receive that honor. Almost a unanimous choice of the league's press, radio and TV representatives, he received first-place votes in five of the six league cities and 28 of a possible 30 points.

Zellio Toppazini of Providence, league-leading scorer, placed second with 10 points. Frank Mathers, Pittsburgh defenseman, received the other first-place vote and seven points. Larry Wilson, Buffalo; Cal Stearns, Cleveland, and Willie Marshall, Pittsburgh, drew three points each. Points are counted on a 5-3-1 basis for first, second and third place votes.

Bower, also chosen for the league's all-star team, will get a league bonus of \$300 and the Leslie Cunningham Trophy, which is given each season by the St. Louis Flyers booster club.

Fishermen Dust Off Rods As Fishing Season Opens

Canadian fishermen, armed with rods and rule-books, checked their tackle and prepared to troll and cast as the 1956 fresh-water game fishing season opened this month in many provinces.

Apart from Alberta, where there is no closed season, and British Columbia, where fish can be caught in some part of the province at all times of the year, fishing becomes legal this month in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba.

The Newfoundland and Saskatchewan seasons start next month. The federal government regulates salt-water game fish.

For the prospective fisherman the rule book is a must in his equipment, if he isn't to get on the wrong side of the law.

In Newfoundland salmon rivers, where licences are required, fly is the only legal bait. In Nova Scotia jigging of sport fish is prohibited, while in New Brunswick the sale and serving of trout in hotels is illegal, as is catching fish under artificial lights.

Manitoba has a law that no one shall buy, sell or offer for sale any fish caught by angling. Live bait is illegal in most parts of Saskatchewan.

Alberta imposes a \$1 to \$1,000 fine on persons found using more than three hooks on one line when angling. In British Columbia it is unlawful to carry fishing tackle without licence if travelling in any but a public conveyance.

In Newfoundland, where sports fishermen took 11,500 salmon last year, regulations are being reviewed and changes are expected before the season gets under way May 24.

LAWS VARY

Licence laws vary from Nova Scotia, where residents fish free and non-residents pay \$5 for the privilege, to Alberta, where a \$1 licence covers all types of fishing, eliminating a special \$2.25 trout licence. Persons under 18 can fish free in British Columbia.

A month was lopped off the trout season in New Brunswick this year as a conservation measure. The season now runs from April 15-Sept. 15 instead of April 1-Sept. 30.

The length of the season remains unchanged for most varieties of fish in other provinces.

Early fishing reports are scanty but poor weather and impassable roads to good ponds and streams in Prince Edward Island cut down April catches in that province.

In getting ready their tackle, fishermen this year are reported by department stores to be preferring lighter equipment. Solid and hollow fibre-glass rods have almost supplanted bamboo and steel rods.

EXPECTS CLOSE SERIES

Regina coach Murray Armstrong said the Marlies "played a sound defensive game and certainly deserved to win" over the Canadiens.

He said his team "might be a little rusty after the long lay off, but should be well-rested" for what he expected will be a "close series."

Last year the Toronto team defeated the Pats in five games.

If they down the westerners again this year, they will become the second team in 38 years to win the national title two years running. Oshawa Generals won the Memorial Cup in 1939 and 1940.

Following tonight's opener at Maple Leaf Gardens, the next three games are scheduled there for Sunday, Wednesday, and Friday. Additional games will be scheduled later if the series goes beyond four games.

Thursday night both teams will be guests at the first annual Memorial Cup dinner, attended by notables of both professional and amateur hockey.

Bermuda Wins Fourth Race

HAMILTON, Bermuda (AP)—Bermuda yachtmen won the fourth race in the international design series for the Amortia Cup Thursday and took a 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven series against Long Island Sound sailors.

Led by Bert Darrell and Sir Bayard Dill, who took the first two places, the Bermuda team won 35'4" to 25". H. G. Seymour took third place to pace the Long Island team.

Richardson And Patty In Finals

BOURNEMOUTH, England (AP) Ham Richardson of Westfield, N. J., a Rhodes scholar at Oxford and a member of the American Davis Cup team, turned back Sweden's 21-year-old Ulf Schmidt, and veteran Budge Patty of Los Angeles and Paris outlasted Britain's top-ranked Roger Becker to reach the semi-finals of the British hard courts tennis tournament Thursday.

Richardson, who played seven hours of tennis Wednesday, beat Schmidt 6-3, 6-3, 4-6, 6-3. After winning the first two sets and leading 4-0 in the third, the American began to tire just as Schmidt found his best form and Ulf ran off six straight games. Then Richardson drank some sweetened tea during the intermission and returned to win.

Patty, secondseeded player in the tournament, rallied after a slow start and beat Becker 11-9, 4-6, 6-4, 6-4.

Doug Harvey Named Winner Of Norris Memorial Trophy

MONTREAL (CP)—Doug Harvey of Montreal Canadiens is the winner of the James Norris Memorial Trophy as the outstanding defenseman in the National Hockey League for the 1955-56 season, the league announced Thursday.

It is the second successive year that Harvey has captured the award. He also receives \$1,000 from the NHL.

Harvey received 156 points of a possible 180, far in front in the voting by sports writers, broadcasters and telecasters in the six NHL cities. Closest was Bill Gadsby of New York Rangers, with 59 points, winner in the 1953-54 season when the trophy was first presented. He was third with 44 points.

At the half-way mark Harvey had 78 points and duplicated this figure in the second half of the season. In the mid-season voting Kelly had 17 points and Gadsby 16.

Harvey, a native Montrealer, is 31 years old and first joined Canadiens in the 1947-48 season. He was also named to the 1955-56 first all-star team.

The Norris trophy, in memory of the late president of Detroit Red Wings, is awarded "the regular defence player who demonstrates throughout the season the greatest all-round ability in that position."

Two Horses To Race Via T.V.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Two horses 3,000 miles apart will race each other Sunday afternoon via television.

It will be a match race at 1-16 miles. The horses, yet to be selected, will carry 115 pounds each. Willie Shoemaker will be aboard one of them at Hollywood Park, 10 miles from Los Angeles. The veteran stakes jockey, Eddie Arcaro, will ride the other at Jamaica, 13 miles from New York, on Long Island.

Cameras will be synchronized at the tracks to show the horses racing on one screen divided laterally. George Cassidy, New York starter, will monitor a screen showing both horses in the starting gate and will send them off together. Fred Caposela, a New York announcer, will call the race.

The screens will show the eight poles at both courses and the speed of the cameras will be so co-ordinated that the relative positions of the horses can be determined accurately at a glance.
