AGGRAVATED ASSAULT.

The Victim is Badly Injured—May Not Recover.

"Smiler" Walsh, who assaulted Christy Macdonald at her home near Pownal Village on Sunday morning, was arrested at China Point yesterday afternoon and brought before Edward Wood, J. P., for trial. After hearing the evidence of Miss Macdonald, Walsh was sent up for trial on a charge of assault and battery, and is now lodged in Queen's County Jail.

The assault was aggravated and cowardly in the extreme, and the victim, who is upwards of 80 years of age, may not survive.

It seems that about twelve o'clock on Saturday night Walsh forced open the door of the house in which Miss Macdonald lived alone, and proceeding to where she slept pulled her out of bed, breaking the side of the bed in the act. Then began a struggle between the two which lasted until daylight, Miss Macdonald fighting heroically in defence and at last compelling her cowardly assailant to leave the house.

In the struggle Miss Macdonald was severely injured about the face, arms, legs and back. Her face was badly scratched and cut, the flesh on her hands and arms was hacked and torn, and her legs and back are also in a bad way from the ill-treatment she received. It is thought that the injuries on the woman's face and arms were inflicted by a piece of iron sled shoeing.

In this pitiable condition Miss Macdonald was found by the children of a neighbor late on Sunday. Dr. Collins was summoned from Vernon River with all possible despatch, and he did everything in his power to alleviate the sufferings of the poor woman.

Miss Macdonald positively identified Walsh as her assailant.

Walsh, when asked what he had to say, said he had no recollection of the affair.

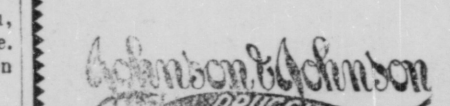
