

# Walcott Appeals To Have Result Of Title Bout Friday Set Aside

CHICAGO, (AP) — The postponement of the Rocky Marciano-Walcott fight, which probably will be one of the loudest and longest in boxing history, enters the official stage Monday.

The Illinois athletic commission has arranged to receive the plea of the Walcott camp that the result be set aside.

Walcott and his manager, Felix Bocchicchio, maintain it was the arm of referee Frank Sikora, not Marciano, that accounted for Walcott's knockout at two minutes and 35 seconds of the first round in Friday night's Chicago Stadium heavyweight championship fight.

They accuse Sikora of a "fast count" and their lawyers, Angelo Malandra, said he will file a formal protest with the commission Monday.

**Only Polite Interest**

Members of the commission while politely expressing interest in hearing the Walcott argument haven't left much doubt that it will take more than conversation to set aside the verdict.

Chairman Livingston Osborne said after the bout that as far as he was concerned, "the fight is over. Marciano won fair and square." Commissioners Lou Radzienda and Johnny Behr agreed.

In addition to the IAC meeting, another interesting post-fight item is scheduled Monday—first showing to a selected audience of three-dimensional movies of the fight.

# Walcott's Manager Keen On Rematch; Wants No Blemish On Jersey Joe

CHICAGO, (AP) — Jersey Joe Walcott's manager says he wants a rematch with heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano, giving his entire purse to charity, because he wants no blemish on the record of the 39-year-old former champ. Walcott had planned to retire, win or lose.

Felix Bocchicchio, Walcott's manager, said he would file a formal protest with the Illinois Athletic Commission Monday of the "fast count" and ask the commission to view the movies to check the accuracy of the timing of Marciano's knockout victory in 2:35 of the first round Friday night at the Chicago Stadium.

**Claims Most Unfair**

"It was the most unfair thing the public ever saw," said Bocchicchio at a press conference. "For the benefit of the American public, they should see the fight again. Joe didn't get a fair shake."

Bocchicchio complained that the ring wasn't normal size and said it was heavily padded to handicap Walcott.

"Joe followed instructions," he said. "He was supposed to get up at the count of seven. That's all I told him to get up. That's all I heard."

"I didn't think he got hit a punch up to the one that ended it. Joe doesn't want to go out with any reflections on him."

Walcott, listening while his manager talked to the press, said, "I heard him (referee Frank Sikora) count seven and started to get up. He pushed me down and waved Marciano the winner."

**Lot Of Beef In Punch**

At an earlier press conference, Marciano said he put "a lot of beef behind the knockout punch. I came out to do my job... in the ring," he said. "And I think that is what he should have done. I think I would have got up and fought."

"I must have hit him in the best possible spot," Marciano said.

"When I heard the count get up to eight, I said to myself: 'This fellow is not going to get up.' He hadn't even looked at the referee."

Marciano said the right uppercut that flattened Walcott and the short right-hand punch that did the job at Philadelphia in their first match were about equal in strength.

Marciano's future plans still are undecided. Al Weil, his manager, is considering offers to fight Roland La Starza or Ezzard Charles in September.

**Falling Referee**

Meanwhile, Bocchicchio continued a verbal flailing of referee Sikora and conditions surrounding the fight generally. He wasn't getting much support.

Bocchicchio said "nobody" heard Sikora counting and that Jersey Joe would have risen before the 10 had he known the count was that far along. He and lawyer Malandra also maintained the ring canvas was "overpadded" and that the ring was too small.

But the "timekeepers," referee Sikora and hundreds of sports-writers and insiders said the count was fair and that Jersey Joe sat it out, voluntarily or otherwise.

Although Bocchicchio says he wants a rematch, neither Marciano nor his manager, Al Weil, appears particularly interested.

Marciano's plans for the immediate future are indefinite. Among possibilities are a September match with either Roland La Starza or Ezzard Charles, and an exhibition tour of the South Pacific and Japan.

# Poulton To Fight New York Boxer Here In June

Negotiations have almost been completed for a June 8 fight here between Harry Poulton and Johnny Fruit of New York, it has been announced by Ivan Docherty of the Islanders and Boosters Club executives.

The fight will be a tune-up for Poulton who meets Yvon Durelle late in June for the Canadian middleweight boxing championship. It will be staged by the executives of the Islanders and Boosters Clubs.

In meeting Fruit, Poulton will be facing a man much the same size as Durelle. Fruit, who fights out of New York but who was born in the Southern States, weighs about 160 pounds and is regarded as a good prospect in fistic circles.

Docherty saw Fruit fighting in New York last fall. On that occasion he put his opponent away in the second round, so Ivan didn't see too much of him. However, he looked like a pretty capable

performer and Docherty stated last night that he would give fight fans plenty to talk about after they had seen him in action.

He is young, punches hard and gets his share of fights around New York, the world's boxing capital despite all efforts of Boxing Commissioner Robert Christenbury to move it to Chicago.

The fight should be what the doctor ordered for Poulton. It will sharpen his reflexes and timing for the battle with Durelle.

Harry has been doing road work for the past several weeks and boxing a few rounds each day as he steps up the tempo of his training grind.
