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Dalton Resigns From Labor High Command

LONDON (AP) - Hugh Dalton, 57, resigned Friday night from the Labor party's high command and urged that his elderly colleagues—with the exception of leader Clement Attlee—step down also to make way for younger men.

A more youthful executive group is the Labor party's only hope for the future, said Dalton, one of the chief theorists of British socialism and former chancellor of the exchequer.
He accepted Attlee on the ground that Attlee is the only man able to reconcile warring factions of the party, which took a beating from Prime Minister Eden's Conservatives in the May 26 general election.

Dalton has been an influential member of the Labor high command, Attlee's shadow cabinet. This is the policy-making board, which would become the real cabinet in any future Labor government.
Writing Attlee of his decision, Dalton said nine of the shadow cabinet's members are over 65 and the party should start the new Parliament June 5 with a younger group, preferably made up of men under 50.

Dalton's decision was applauded by the Daily Mirror, pro-Labor tabloid which has been campaigning for a reshuffle of the party since its election defeat.

CCL President Given Warm Welcome By TLC

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—A roaring welcome was given Thursday to A. R. Mosher, president of the Canadian Congress of Labor, as he went before the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada convention to talk of TLC-CCL merger plans.

The white-haired boss of the TLC's big rival, making his first appearance at a TLC convention in 33 years, got a rafter-rattling reception as he told delegates that "bitterness and divided effort" among Canadian labor groups now seem to be nearing an end.
The 74-year-old Mosher, with a TLC badge pinned on his lapel, addressed the 150 delegates at the convention in approving terms of a merger that will unite the two congresses into a 1,000,000-member body to be called the Canadian Labor Congress.

Top officers of the CCL also have endorsed the agreement, and it is to go before the CCL at its October congress in Toronto.
Immediately after the TLC's approval of the agreement Wednesday, its executive sent an invitation to Ottawa to Mosher, who last stepped onto a TLC convention floor in 1922 when he was pleading unsuccessfully against having his Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees thrown out of the TLC because of a jurisdictional conflict with the powerful Brotherhood of Railway & Ship Employees.

Thursday, Mosher's one-time enemy, Frank H. Hall, of the railway clerks, escorted the CCL veteran into the hall, and TLC president Claude Jodoin threw his arms around Mosher's shoulder as he reached the platform.
Mosher has agreed to yield the presidency of the merged organization to the 41-year-old Jodoin, now in his first term as TLC president.

"We have a tremendous task before us," he told the delegates Monday. "Anyone who believes in the merger must be prepared to do his share."

Salary of Judges To Be Increased

OTTAWA, (CP)—Legislation to increase judges' salaries was announced Friday on the Commons order paper.
A resolution to be introduced Monday by Justice Minister Garsner does not disclose what the increases will be for judges of the Supreme Court of Canada, the Exchequer Court of Canada, and the superior and county courts in the province.

There has been speculation that the raises will be about 20 to 25 per cent.
At present, Chief Justice Patrick Keelie of Canada gets a \$25,000 a year, and the eight other justices receive \$20,000.

Chief justices of provincial Supreme Courts and president J. T. Thorson of the Exchequer Court get \$18,000. Provincial Supreme Court justices are paid \$14,000, the same as the judges of the Exchequer Court.
