A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property and Poll in the City of Charlottetown for a Water Works Fund, under Statute 50th Victoria, Chapter 8.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:—

1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for a Water Works Fund, under said Statute, for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1891, and ending the 31st day of December, A. D. 1891, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of ONE-THIRTIETH OF ONE PER CENT. on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and added to the Poll Tax thereon, and to be paid by the owners of the same on the 5th day of April, A.
