A Dish You Can Ready For Unexpected Guests

"This a la king souffle consists of two parts:
"The first is an a la king sauce containing diced oddments of chicken, roast veal, ham or canned meat; or sliced hard-cooked eggs, or flaked canned tuna, lobster or crabmeat. The second is a plain, puffy omelet mixture.

OMelet Souffle Topping: Separate 4 eggs; Beat the yolks until lemon-colored. Then beat in 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper, 1 tsp. flour and 2 tsp. milk.

"To MAKE SAUCE
"A la king sauce may be purchased canned or frozen or be quickly homemade as follows:
"A la king sauce: Melt 3 tbs. butter in a small frying pan.

TRICK OF THE CHEF
The favorite plain American doughnuts are very good as made commercially.

"Beat 1 egg yolk light with 1/2 tsp. sherry flavoring.
"Add 1/2 canned pimento, diced, and the desired meat, eggs or fish.
