WEDNESDAY, Oct. 8—It is one hundred and twenty years since Henry Fielding, the novelist of the 18th century, breathed his last. He was born April 22, 1707, wrote many plays between 1728-43; was a magistrate till 1761. Published "Joseph Andrews," 1742; "Jonathan Wild," 1744; and "Tom Jones," 1749; "Amelia," 1751. His brother, Sir John Fielding, who was blind, was a good lawyer, and succeeded him as a Bow street magistrate in 1761, which he retained till his death in 1780. It was his sister Sarah, who published "Adventures of David Simple," 1722.

Roads and Bridges.—An Alberton correspondent mentions a great want supplied by the efficient Road Supervisor there, Henry Oliver, Esq. J. P., by putting a double range of cedar and juniper posts to mark off a dangerous part of the main highway near the Dock Church, leading out of Alberton. Several accidents have occurred there, and the Supervisor is entitled to credit for taking steps for the protection of the public.

The Tryon correspondent of the Summerside Pioneer is decidedly in error when he says that the two public schools of that Settlement were built during the rule of the much-abused Davies Government. The site of the graded school in Tryon North, near Lord's Hall, was not fixed upon until several months after the defeat of the Davies Government, and the schoolhouse was necessarily erected by the present Government. As a matter of fact the Davies party, owing to the difference of opinion which existed in the locality as to the best location, made this an excuse for not building the schoolhouse. We call attention to this matter simply because that credit ought to be given where credit is due.

DRAMATIC.—"The Hidden Hand" drew another big house last night for Mr. Webber's excellent company; and was remarkably well received. PATSEY KAVANAGH and a man named Power were arrested between 9 and 10 o'clock this morning, near Dr. Jenkins' Farm, on the North River Road. Patsey and his confederate had been making a tour of the country, and amid various occupations they tried their hand at burglary. At this they were only too successful, for they entered the store of Mr. S. H. Brown, at Stanley Bridge, and carried away enough of clothing, boots, etc., to fit them out in good style for some time to come. News of the burglary having been conveyed to Marshal Flynn, thinking they would probably take the way to the city, that officer at once despatched Policemen Bradley and Doyle to look them up. The police-men took the North River Road, and had not proceeded many miles before they sighted the happy couple leisurely coming to town among the other visitors to the Exhibition. Taking the alarm they ran to the woods, and the police-men gave chase. After a short run the officers succeeded in catching them and brought them to the city. They will thus be unable to do the Exhibition this year, where their light fingers might have been of much service to them.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Train Robbing.

DENVER, COL., Oct. 7. A special says, early yesterday morning ten miles west of here, an attempt was made to rob the Santafe passenger train. The robbers evidently intended to ditch the train, having drawn the spikes. The passenger train came along however at such speed that they passed over the rails without spreading them. The robbers lying in ambush then fired a volley from rifle at the train but hurt no one. Subsequently a freight train was ditched at the place and an engineer killed.

France's Chinese Policy.

PARIS, Oct. 7. M. Fallieres, Minister of Public Instruction, in making a speech last night at a banquet at Moissac, said that France was not engaged in a policy of conquest. The Government merely desired to exact respect for violated treaties and to avenge Chinese insults to the French flag.

Steamer Foundered.

LONDON, Oct. 7. Advice received here state that the steamship Miramar, while on a voyage from Yokohama for Hong Kong, foundered at sea. All hands on board were lost with the exception of two Chinese.

French Consul Shot.

M. Bavero, French Diplomatic Agent, has received a telegram stating that M. Herbin, French Consul at Khartoum, was killed at the same time that Col. Stewart and party were massacred by Arabs.

Dongola Garrisoned.

CAIRO, Oct. 7. The city of Dongola is now garrisoned with 600 British troops and 1,000 Egyptians. The health of all is excellent. The influence of El Mahdi with the Egyptians is rapidly waning.

Lord Northbrook's Proposal.

CAIRO, Oct. 7. Lord Northbrook proposes the abolition of the Egyptian army, and the substitution of 9,000 police in its stead. The Egyptian ministry oppose the plan.

Speculation About Sir John.

OTTAWA, Oct. 7. There is much speculation as to what takes Sir John to England. Every newspaper seems to have a different cause for his departure.

Teemer and Conley.

BOSTON, Oct. 7. Teemer and Conley have signed articles for their race, Conley getting ten seconds start in four miles.

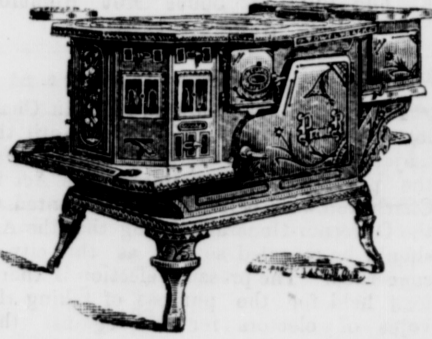
