

Highway Assault Cases Appealed To Supreme Court

Sentences imposed this week in Queen's County Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet's court on several Albany youths convicted of various offences have been appealed to the Supreme Court and will be heard at the next sittings, it was learned yesterday.

The sentences were imposed on charges of disturbance and assault following trials on pleas of guilty by the defendants. The sentences announced by the Magistrate were as follows: Roy Walsh and Earl MacKay, 30 days in jail each for a disturbance at Crapaud; Earl MacKay for assault on J. H. Kinch, P. J. Kinch and Kenneth MacDougall, 10 days in jail on each charge; Douglas MacLeod on the same three assault charges, 10 days in jail on each charge; David MacLeod for assaulting the two Kinches, 10 days on each charge.

Pending the appeal to the Supreme Court, which will sit next month on the second Tuesday, the appellants have been released on bail.

Good Season For Pasturing Cattle

Pastures far superior to any known last year are reported this fall by the Experimental Farm whose authorities state that steers are still making good gains where taken off the pastures.

Mr. R. C. Parent, Superintendent of the Farm, said it was hoped to leave the young stock out until quite late in the year as they could go into the housing barn whenever they choose on cold nights.

At the Farm they have already harvested two fields of Irish Cobblers and put in fall rye. This it is increasingly more common as a soil erosion measure. By the time severe frosts occur there will be several inches of the rye above ground and this holds the soil together.

The grain crop this year was very good and has all been safely harvested by now. It is also expected that an exceptional crop of potatoes will be dug.

Recently the Farm staff has been busy attending and taking part in exhibitions and plowing matches and this week Mr. Parent visited Irishtown where he gave a talk on his European trip to the Irish town W.I. and a large group of interested members of the community who filled the local hall.

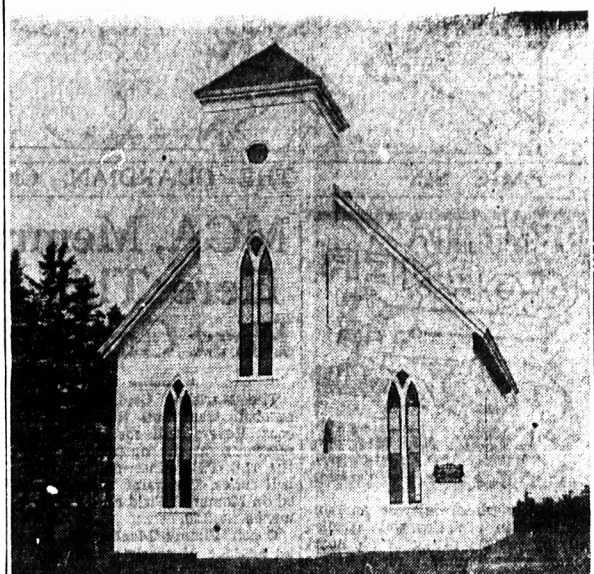

Church To Be Scene Of Rededication Services



Rededication services to be held tomorrow in the Presbyterian Church in Hartsville (shown above) recall the fact that the original Hartsville Church was built in 1845 and stood about in the middle of the present cemetery. The congregation at that time was known as the Strathalbyn (later Strathalbane) charge and included Rev. Strathalbyn and Breadalbane. In 1862 the old structure was torn down and sold for its lumber, and many of the homes of the community are finished with material from this church. The present church, which stands on one of the highest points of land on the island, was built in the same year. Recently it has been thoroughly renovated on the outside and in the interior.

The first minister in Hartsville was the Rev. Alexander Sutherland. All of the worship was conducted in the Gaelic language since the original settlers were of Highland stock, and spoke only their native tongue.

The influence of the church in this community is shown by the number of men who have gone into the world to testify in behalf of the cause of Christ. Among those who have thus dedicated themselves were three MacLeod brothers, Rev. Donald B. Rev. John B. and Rev. Angus B. Still living are Rev. Dan MacDonald, missionary in Africa; Rev. Dr. A. D. MacKenzie, retired United Church minister, living in Charlottetown; Rev. Ira MacDonald, of the United Church, preaching in Ontario; Rev. R. E. MacLeod in the ministry of the Baptist Church; Rev. Donald Nicholson who is one of the guest preachers; and Miss Mary MacKenzie, a Deaconess of the Presbyterian Church at Tryon.

The present incumbent, Rev. Lawrence Blaikie is a native of Durham in Picotou County, N.S. He attended Toronto Bible College, Mount Allison University and last spring graduated from Knox Presbyterian College in Toronto. He is married and has one child.

At the morning service tomorrow the sacraments of Communion and Baptism will be observed, with Rev. Mr. Blaikie presiding. Captain Tilcombe of the Salvation Army will be the guest speaker in the afternoon assisted in the musical part of the worship by the Zion Male Quartette. At 7:00 p.m. Rev. Donald Nicholson of Clyde River will be the guest speaker, with the Cornwall Trio providing the special music.
