

Saint Dunstan's To Host Students

Saint Dunstan's University will host 20 adult students at the summer course at the Coady International Institute, St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish when they tour P.E.I. this coming week. The international group which represents 31 countries, have completed their course on the adult education technique of the Antigonish Movement and while on the island will visit co-operative organizations, credit union, and other community development projects.

The contingent will be under the direction of John Chisholm, assistant director of the Institute along with R. Cameron and Leonard Ois.

On Monday the group journeyed to O'Leary, Tignish, Mount Carmel and central Lot 16 to visit co-operative organization and community pasture. Then the ladies of the community will serve meals to the visitors and in the evening a social get together will take place in the community hall of Lot 16 where the students plan to expose some of their natural talents. The program is open to the public.

Father Allan Macdonald, director of the expansion department of St. Dunstan's stated that many of these men and women are interested in agriculture and will be given an opportunity to visit some of our island farms. Their itinerary will include besides Tignish, O'Leary, Lot 16, Mount Carmel, co-operatives, credit unions, and Charlottetown Experimental Farm; North Rustico, Georgetown and Souris. Following a visit to Green Gables, and relaxation at Cavenish Beach on Wednesday afternoon, the international body will move to the Confederation Centre to see "Anne of Green Gables". Three Coady Institute Buses will leave for Antigonish on Friday, via Borden.

Arthur Bruce, 55 Douglas St. Charlottetown, died in the Prince Edward Island Hospital Friday afternoon after a lengthy illness.

Mr. Bruce was born in Charlottetown in October, 1907 and lived his entire life in the Island capital. He went to work with The Guardian in 1923 and was still employed with that newspaper when he became ill some nine months ago.

The late Mr. Bruce was an expert pressman and his knowledge of the press room, where he was foreman, was indeed great. He was a most dedicated workman and he gave every newspaper he handled the utmost attention.

After treatment in Halifax last fall, his condition improved for a time but early this spring he suffered a relapse from which he failed to recover.

Canada Pays High Price In Meeting Requirements

OTTAWA (Special) — Canada pays a high price for being bilingual. The need to produce official documents and reports in the two official languages adds some millions of dollars a year to the cost of operating parliament and the government.

In addition, delays of weeks and months occur in the tabling of reports because of the task of translation and the printing of two versions of voluminous documents.

The government's translation service has been improving steadily in the past year or two, with the employment of more and better translators. But it is well known that some reports have been delayed for many weeks because the original translations were full of errors, requiring the work to be done a second time.

MATTER COMES TO HEAD — While the government has always been conscious of the bilingual requirements, it was not until the arrival here of Real Caouette and Gilles Gregoire that the matter came to a head.

Diplomat Seeks Political Asylum

WASHINGTON (AP) — The state department confirmed Friday that a Chinese diplomat has sought political asylum in the U.S. embassy in Damascus and asked for political refuge.

Press Officer Robert J. McCloskey said the individual whom he could not identify now is at the American embassy in the Syrian capital.

He refused to give any more details or to confirm that it was a diplomat from Communist China who had approached the embassy. Nationalist China, however, does not maintain an embassy in Syria.
