Survey To Probe Causeway Site

Frederick T. Brown, general manager of the engineering firm of Northumberland Consultants, said yesterday that several of the aids have been received for the drilling and sampling project in the Northumberland area.

The work is part of the on-site survey for the proposed causeway between P.E.I. and N.B. for which the firm has been retained to handle the project.

Holes, some of which will extend down to a depth of some 100 feet will be drilled along the anticipated route of the causeway, to establish the nature of the under-water rock.

The line of survey runs from Berwin dock to the south end of Jermain Island, approximately three miles north of Cape Tormentine dock, Mr. Brown said.

The company has four schemes under consideration for the type of structure, ranging from a solid causeway to a partial causeway linked by either a tunnel or bridge.

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Three Escape Injury As Car Turns Over

ALBERTON — A late model car, driven by Joseph A. Peters, Camp Petawawa, Ont., went out of control on a sharp curve in the highway at Montrose yesterday afternoon and turned upside down in the ditch.

All three occupants escaped serious injury. The driver received numerous lacerations while a passenger, Mrs. Hery Pleasant View, was not injured.

A young boy in the car was treated for head lacerations. The vehicle, owned by Sylvère Peters, Pleasant View, was extensively damaged.

CNR Official To Meet With Prov. Cabinet

Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossier announced yesterday that Ernest Cook, Minister, general manager of the Atlantic region CNR, has been asked to attend a meeting of the provincial cabinet next Thursday.

At that time discussions will take place in connection with the company's proposal to curtail service between Charlottetown and Miramichi.

The proposal to reduce the train service has resulted in a letter from a farm near the western section of the province.

HE JUDGES NOT THE PEOPLE

Righteousness in Religion

(Editor's note: The following Sunday school lesson is based on the scriptures produced by the Division of Christian Education, National Council of Churches in the U.S. and is used by permission.)

The collection of psalms in today's lesson reflects the importance of righteousness in religion.

The word comes, of course, from our simple word "right." To be righteous, therefore, is to do what is right.

In Psalm 11, which is one of David's, we find that the author is in a situation so desperate that friends urge him to flee for his life. He refuses, not only because he has faith in God's upholding of the righteous, but because he would not let his righteousness of this part, but his word.

Psalm 72 is one of the only two in the Psalter which we can tell, were authored by Solomon. The other is the 127th. His opening prayer is for himself and his heir, that their judgments may be righteous according to God's justice, in the first clause, probably refers to the specific judgments which the king must make; righteousness, in the second, probably here means the inner spirit of accord with God's will as he exercises any specific judgment right.

In verse six, Solomon asks that he and his son be like "rain upon grass" which at first glance seems odd because literally this is not a blessing at all. What the author must mean is rain upon a newly mown field from which the old grass has been cleared. This would cause the grass to sprout again, almost overnight, just as a good leader's influence brings out the latent potential in his followers.

The claim to such homage as indicated in verses 8-14 is not based on force but on justice. Unfortunately, Solomon, instead of divorcing the oppressed and poverty-stricken, made his burdens even heavier, despite his prayer. The rulers to accomplish this are God and His Son.

In contrast to Psalm 72, Psalm 82 emphasizes the evils of unjust judgments. Here God is judging not the people themselves, but the unjust rulers of the world. This is the reference of the word "gods" in the first verse of Psalm 81: 2-8, where we see the same reference used for the word "Israel's" judges. Verse 9 speaks of God arising and judging man, yet throughout the New Testament it is usually the Son of God who is appointed to do the earthly judging, as Christ Himself said, "The fundamental criterion for a judgment is righteousness."

In Psalm 106 we return to the old theme of God's everlasting righteousness and patience, and Israel's everlasting unrighteousness. The problem here is the one of the necessity of judgment on the part of the righteous, of the unrighteous, especially if they are one's own unrighteous; this is the problem faced by every discipling parent.

The task of Amos was roughly the equivalent to that of prophets in the courts today, who must point out the sinfulness in an era of outward progress. Amos lived in the eighth century B.C. under Uzziah and Jeroboam II, a period of great splendor and prosperity for Israel.

God exercises judgment over the human judges of the people who are often most unrighteous in their judgments. Often they favor the rich and powerful over the poor and inconspicuous.—Psalm 82.

When certain Israelites resented the authority of God's appointed leader, Moses, He executed judgment by opening the earth to swallow them.—Psalm 106:16-18; Numbers 16:27-33.
