Cyrus Ching Reviews Years As Trouble-Shooter

NEW YORK, (CP)—Harmony between management and labor is largely a matter of human relations, Cyrus S. Ching argues in "Review and Reflection," an account of his 50 years as a trouble-shooter in labor disputes.

Mr. Ching, a native of Red Point, P. E. I., retired last year after seven years as director of the United States federal mediation and conciliation service and chairman of the wage stabilization board.

The book, published by B. C. Forbes, is a series of observations on the author's experience in the field of labor relations.

Mr. Ching tells of his early life in Prince Edward Island, before his departure for Boston in 1900 at the age of 24.

He tells of his career as a motion picture salesman, a railway worker and a union leader.

His first test with the rubber company came with his handling of a strike in its Montreal plant.

He played a similar role in calming continent-wide unrest in the U. S. Rubber Company's plants shortly after joining the company in 1919.

Rowing Team Begins Training For Empire Games

By WALTER GRAY Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO, (CP)—Icy blasts swept over Lake Ontario Tuesday night and temperatures dropped to near zero. Inside the lakeshore headquarters of the Argonaut Rowing Club more than 25 youths wiped away perspiration.

The club held its initial workout of a six-month training program that will take many of them to the British Empire Games rowing trials at Port Dalhousie, Ont., July 3 and 4, and hope, eventually to the games themselves at Vancouver July 30-Aug. 7.

Three nights a week they will bend over the rowing machines and run through muscle building exercises under the expert eye of Harry Kay-Smith, Argo rowing coach, and his assistant, John Brodie of Brockville, Ont.

From the Toronto club and similar organizations across the country will come the team to represent Canada in Commonwealth competition, and, says Kay-Smith, the chances for victory "look pretty good."

Two years ago at the Olympic Games in Helsinki, Canadian oarsmen lost their fight before the games. The team's shells were wrecked aboard ship during an Atlantic storm on the way over. The Canadians competed in borrowed shells and lost very race.

"If we hadn't had the debacle of losing our boats, our crews would have finished way up in contention," said Kay-Smith.

The Argo coach predicted Canada's main opposition in the games will come from Australia and England. Competition will be held in the eight-oar, four-oar with coxswain, pair-oar with coxswain classes, as well as single and double sculls.

"Just when we get on the water depends on the vagaries of the weather," Kay-Smith said. "When we trained for the Olympics we chipped the ice inside the breakwater on Lake Ontario and we will undoubtedly do the same this year."

Third Largest Refinery In Canada To Be Built Near Halifax

HALIFAX (CP)—Imperial Oil Ltd. today announced a \$30,000,000 rebuilding of its oil refinery at Imperoyal, across the harbor from Halifax.

Superintendent G. R. McMillin said completion of the project in the summer of 1956 will make it the third largest refinery in Canada, surpassed only by those at Montreal and Sarnia.

The new plant will have a capacity of 41,625 barrels a day compared to 22,000 at present.

Work will start in 1956, making it the biggest single construction project in the Maritimes, surpassing the Canso causeway and Halifax harbor bridge now being built. The Camp Gagetown project in New Brunswick will probably cost \$40,000,000 but less than half of this is for construction.

The refinery will include the latest in equipment, making it "the most modern of its kind in the world."

The existing plant will continue operation while the new one is being constructed on the same site. It will serve the Maritime provinces and Newfoundland, including Labrador, with products made from crude oil brought in by tanker from Venezuela. This will include the two types of fuel needed for modern jet aircraft.

Mr. McMillin said the present refinery started in 1916 and outmodered since 1936, is outmoded. The working force of 470 men will not be increased but the additional output will result from more modern equipment and processes.
