Silver Jubilee Held For Pastor At Summerfield

The parishioners of St. James parish, Summerfield celebrated the 25th anniversary of ordination to the Holy Priesthood of their pastor, Rev. Eugene L. Murray on Sunday last.

At 4.30 p.m. the ladies of the parish sub-division of the catholic women's League served dinner in the Rectory to the neighboring pastors and to the immediate relatives of their parish priest.

At eight in the evening the Jubiliarian celebrated Solemn High Mass, in the beautiful St. James Church, with Very Rev. J.P.E. O'Hanley pastor of Cardigan as Deacon of the Mar. with Rev. Harold J. Croken, pastor of Kinkora as sub-deacon and Rev. John Cash of Verdon River as master of ceremonies.

At the conclusion of the Mass an address of congratulations on behalf of the parishioners was read to Father Murray by Mr. Louis O'Connor, and a parse presented by Mr. Everett Reeves. Mr. Clayton Green read an address from the Emerald Branch of the Benevolent Irish Society and Mr. Edward Murtagh presented a purse on behalf of the society. Then followed an address read by Mrs. Thomas Sullivan for the Parish Sub-division of the C.W.L. and a gift of a silver service was then made by Mrs. Loyola Deighan.

Father Murray was ordained in St. Dunstan's Basilica on May 21st 1932 and was appointed pastor at Summerfield in 1940. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Murray, Rochford Square, Charlottetown.

Annual Meeting Of Co-op Super Market

"We have been burned down, but we have not been burned out," stated Mr. L.C. Calbeck, President of the Central Farmers Co-operative Association Limited who operate the Super Market on Queen Street, at the annual meeting of the company held Tuesday evening at the Clover Club. "We are here to stay," continued Mr. Calbeck in his report to the shareholders, "and our present handicap is only a temporary interruption in our phenomenal growth."

"I may say that more and more people in Charlottetown and the surrounding countryside are investing money in shares and thereby earning for themselves a guaranteed interest on their investment and enjoying the benefit of participating in the company's profits by receiving an annual rebate on their purchases. During the fiscal year ending January 31, 1957, 102 people have purchased shares in the store, and the membership now stands at 692."

In his review of company operations for the past year, Mr. Calbeck presented a remarkable story of growth. The sales volume had increased by 50 per cent over the previous year. The increase was attributed to the opening of the Richmond Street annex on February 9, 1956, providing as it did, larger and more efficient meat and vegetable departments, greater space for displaying groceries and for the easy movement of customers, and improved services and a wider choice of merchandise in all departments.

The annual statement showed that the Association had made a net profit of 20 per cent higher than that of a year ago. Share capital investment had increased by 15,483.21 over that for the previous year and now stands at \$62,288.00.

Central Farmers, under the capable direction of Mr. MacLeod store manager, continued its services to the growers by marketing strawberries and blueberries. The Island crop of blueberries was unusually light in 1956, and it is hoped that a normal crop will be available to the harvesters this season.

REBATE
The meeting noted that a patronage rebate of 5 per cent on the purchases made by shareholders be accredited, and approved a recent direction by the board of directors that the payments be frozen as share capital until business, which had been depleted because of the fire of April 29, was restored to a normal basis. At the same time, the members sanctioned the suggestion by the Board that the interest rate on share capital be raised from its present level of 5 per cent per annum to 6 per cent per annum.

THE FIRE
In discussing the recent fire, both Mr. Calbeck and Mr. MacLeod paid high tributes to the staff for the way in which they had risen to the occasion. The company has managed to keep staff members employed, and they have been busy cleaning up debris, salvaging saleable merchandise, running fire sales, and preparing the Richmond Street section of the building for an early return to business.

This newer section of the store, because of its construction, was not burned, and the scars caused by heat and smoke have been obliterated. The company plans to return at over to the operation of this section where no curtailment in the fruit and vegetable department or meat department will be necessary. Some of the showcases have been renewed to make way for shelves, and it is anticipated that a normal line of groceries will be offered to the public. It is anticipated that the store will be open for business by Friday of this week.

DIRECTORS
Directors whose terms of office concluded with last night's meeting were Mr. H.B. Chandler who recently left the province to reside in Montreal, Mr. W.R. Shaw, and Mr. Jerome Gillis. These men were replaced by Mr. Walter Mutch, and Mrs. Wilfred Driscoll, each of whom will serve a three-year term on the Board. Other directors of the Association are A.W. Kennedy, secretary, Charles Jones, Walter MacMillan, Allison MacMillan, J.J. Macdonald vice-president, and L.C. Calbeck, president.

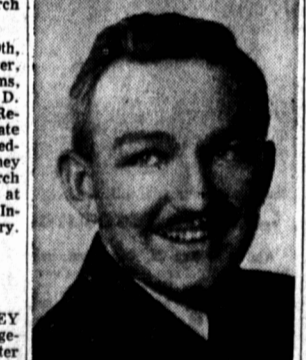
