

June Officially Declared Canada's Dairy Month



HON. MR. PEARSON tributes approximately \$2 billion to Canada's economy, thus our production and dis-

tribution of nature's most nearly perfect food - milk - and the focus derived from it, comprise an industry of vital importance to all of us. "Because of its importance to our national welfare, I am pleased to join with the dairy industry in designating June as Dairy Month in Canada." June was originally designated "Dairy Month" because the Canadian dairy farmers through their own organization, Dairy Farmers of Canada, designated it as the month when dairy men throughout Canada would instruct their dairy processing plants to deduct a certain amount from their cream or other cheeses for the month, this would be contributed to a promotion and advertising fund. That has now been changed so that the contribution runs through the 12-month period and amounts to one-quarter of one percent of the gross return. But June has been retained as "dairy month" as a part of the promotional effort. To date Prince Edward Island dairymen have proudly topped Canada as they have been the only ones to reach 100 percent of their objective. J. Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the P.E.I. federation of agriculture and national chairman of the Dairy Foods Service Bureau, said last night, however, that returns from other provinces are increasing satisfactorily and the money available for advertising the industry is steadily increasing. The bureau is the organization responsible for making Canadians more dairy food conscious, and to encourage additional consumption of the dairy food through research into consumer desires as well as pressure through advertising and promotional media.
