The Delineator for May

The May *Delineator*, with a complete display, pictorial and descriptive, of the latest Spring fashions, contains a wealth of suggestion for those who wish to be smartly gowned, and many other features of interest to women. Hon. Justice David J. Brewer contributes an article on "Woman in the Professions" in which he comments on the significance of the fact that the status of women has changed in the last half century. Florence Rockwell writes her experiences in playing Shaksperian rôles and speaks of the need of a national theatre. A very Abbott and Juliette B. G. Towne contribute short stories for older folks, and Alice Brown a fairy tale for the little ones. There are other features to delight young folks, including a chapter in the serial, "Sunlight and Shadow" and past-times by Lina Beard. In the "Campaign for Safe Foods" Mary Hinman Abel writes of coloring matters and commercial cheats, and the pages devoted to the household are full of suggestions for the kitchen with many other helpful hints to the housewife.
