By-Law for Levying and Specifying the rate of an Assessment on Real Estate and Incomes in the City of Charlottetown.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:

1. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st January 1882, and ending 31st December, A. D. 1882, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one and one-tenth of a cent on every dollar of the value of real estate within the City of Charlottetown, according to the valuation of such real estate as assessed by the assessors of the said city in their valuation roll of such real estate made and duly returned by them on the twenty-second day of April, A. D. 1882.

2. The rate of assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1882, and ending 31st December, A. D. 1882, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-tenth of a cent on every dollar of the amount of the net yearly income salaries or receipts of all persons, partnerships and corporations as assessed by the assessors of the said city in their valuation rolls of such Income Tax made and duly returned by them on the twenty-second day of April, A. D. 1882.

A By-Law for allowing a rate of discount on the Assessment on Real Estate and Incomes for the current year.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:

1. A discount at the rate of two and one-half per cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall on or before the twentieth day of June, A. D. 1882, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Incomes.
