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EUROPEAN NOTES.

The report that Her Majesty was to visit St. Petersburg this September is authoritatively denied.

The report that the conference of Roman Catholic Bishops at Fulda was to endeavor to compromise with the Prussian Government, is not true.

QUEEN VICTORIA and the Emperor of Brazil have exchanged congratulatory messages upon the successful laying of the cable to Brazil.

ADVISED FROM RUSSIA state that the Czar has as a punishment to his nephew Nicholas, who stole his mother's diamonds, banished him for life and deprived him of the Cross of St. George.

SIR CHARLES GAVAN DUFFY, lately Prime Minister of the colony of Victoria, is one of the passengers just arrived by the Australian mail, but is at present in Italy, and will not reach London before the end of the month.

A DESPATCH from St. Petersburg, says alarming rumors prevail in that city respecting the affairs in Central Asia. It is reported that ameer of Kashgaria seized the Russian envoy, and fearing war in consequence, concentrated 15,000 troops on the frontier.

The Spectator remarks that the Duke of Richmond's Patronage Bill may seem to give the Scotch Church new strength; but the idea that in these days of democratic change an established church can rest on so narrow a basis as a sacramental test, is one of the wildest delusions that ever entered the head of a rational man.

The following are the propositions said to have been agreed upon at the Catholic Congress at Venice:— 1. To recommend Catholics, with previous permission from the ecclesiastical authorities, to accept office on the governing bodies of charities. 2. To endeavor to give a Christian character to the education in the Municipal schools. 3. To appoint a committee for founding University Schools.

It is stated in a Paris telegram that, according to the statement of a visitor from St. Marguerite, Marshal Bugeaud, contrary to what is thought, is undergoing and severe detention. He is confined within the fort, and has the terrace to walk upon. The rest of the island is forbidden ground to him. He leads a very unenviable life, and seems resigned to his lot. He reads much works all the morning, is taciturn, and avoids as much as possible showing himself.

PREPARATIONS are being rapidly matured in Ireland for holding the national festival to commemorate the discovery and colonization of the island in 874 by the Norsemen, who were then ruled over by King Harold Haarfager. It is currently reported in Ireland that the Prince of Wales, the Crown Prince of Denmark, and a number of the Danish aristocracy, are to visit Reykjavik shortly, to take part in the festivities.

THERE is in the Canton of Obwalden, Switzerland, a law making it penal for minors to indulge in smoking. The "Patriarchs," otherwise called the government, of the Canton of Obwalden, noticing a shocking increase in the pernicious use of tobacco and snuff by minors generally, have republished an obsolete law on the subject as a reminder that due punishment will be meted out to offenders.

The latest intelligence concerning the crop situation in Europe is to the effect that Great Britain will have an average yield, as also will Belgium and Holland. In Germany there is a slight falling off, and in the Hungarian and Austrian provinces have suffered severely; but in the great grain regions of Southern Russia the outlook is of the most promising character. Europe, however, has so many months to feel that liberal requisition on the granaries of our country will of necessity be made.

THE QUEEN AT A BALL.—The Dundee Advertiser states that the ball given on Friday evening at Balmoral Castle, Her Majesty danced with Prince Albert Victor and Prince George, the sons of the Prince and Princess of Wales, and afterwards took part in a reel with John Brown and Donald Stewart, one of the gamekeepers. Her Majesty seemed to enjoy herself very heartily, and we are informed that this is the first occasion on which she has engaged in dancing since the lamented death of the Prince Consort.

MR. NEWBERRY'S motion in favor of the inspection by the Government of Monastic and Conventual Institutions, was rejected in Parliament by a vote of 237 to 94. Mr. Sullivan and Sir George Boyser were the chief speakers against the motion. Mr. Guthrie Hardy, on behalf of the government, declined to have anything to do with the subject of the motion. Mr. Newberry would hardly be content; he will keep at the work of agitation till he has brought himself into more contempt than even Mr. Whalley.

PUBLIC MEETING. Pursuant to announcement, a public meeting was held at the Cardigan Cross Roads, on Monday, the 29th June, for the purpose of discussing the feasibility of ins pressing upon our Government the necessity of having a covered railway station erected in that locality. The meeting was duly called to order by appointing Mr. Henry Trainor Chairman, and the undersigned Secretary. After the Chairman explained the object of the meeting, several short remarks were made by the Secretary, W. P. Lewis, Esq., G. Moar, Esq., and J. E. McDonald, M. P., who were of opinion that a covered railway station was much required in that section of the country, owing to the amount of produce shipped from the surrounding districts, and showed that injustice was done to King's County respecting railway stations, as the contract was given to a very popular holder, these gentlemen propose to make it cost six thousand dollars, not an economical proposition by any means.

In the next place a few private citizens are suing the city of Halifax, that is, all the citizens of Halifax, for five thousand dollars damages done to the few citizens by the spending the money of all the citizens who are to be made to pay five thousand more dollars for having been the losers of one thousand dollars.

Then again it is the persons who voted for the spending of the money in the Council who ought to be sued and not the whole city—that is if any suit lies at all, about which we have the gravest possible doubts. Then if the city (that is all the citizens) is to pay five thousand dollars damages for the public celebration we presume that the complainants, if they recover, will divide the sum obtained among all who suffered from the day, and every man who lost a day's work, and every woman who was compelled to take the children to the circus, and every boy who felt morally bound to invest his bottom cent in a cigar, will have a share of the sum recovered. We congratulate the lawyers. They will have a very interesting case to discuss. We cannot congratulate the plaintiffs. They have exposed themselves needlessly to ridicule.
