Work Stops Hit Railway

ROME - (AP) - A series of two-hour work stoppages throughout Italy's railway system into early confusion Sunday and added one labor walk by Premier Aldo Moro as he began putting together a new Socialist-supported coalition government.

The strike on the railways throughout Italy was called by the Communist-led General Confederation of Labor. It came at a time when a working man's union was organizing a strike in the Fiat's business community and as a pilot's strike ended the government-owned Alitalia Airlines.

The airline men and rail men are demanding higher wages and contract improvements. A newspaper strike that began July 15 ended, meanwhile, but the issues were not settled and further walkouts by the non-union employees appeared likely.

The rail strikes were effective despite the fact that Communist unions refused to join it on the grounds they were politically inspired.

Although both the railway and airline strikes are against the government, Moro and his present caretaker cabinet have had little time to deal with them. They have been totally occupied trying to resolve the political crisis brought on by Moro's resignation, one because of a defeat in parliament of a single item in his budget.

Protest A. L. Segni asked Moro to stay in office as a caretaker basis until he could form a new, political-oriented government acceptable to Italy's badly divided parliament.

Since then Moro's Christian Democrat party and its coalition partners-Socialists, Democrats and some manufacturers-sought a formula for a new government.

Saturday they found one and Moro is choosing new ministers to present them to Segni within a few days.

By MALCOLM REID LAC BEAUFORT, Que. (CP) - The Canadian Teachers' Federation adopted a resolution Friday calling for a full scale meeting between their own international organization and the major Communist one.

Red Cross Sends \$5,000 To Philipines

Gordon Macdonald, president of the Canadian Red Cross of this province, has been awarded national Red Cross headquarters in Toronto that the society has recently awarded an international appeal to help disaster victims in the Philippines, with a grant of \$5,000 to the Red Cross of that country.

The gift was authorized when the League of Red Cross Societies issued an appeal to various national Red Cross headquarters around the world. The message from Geneva stated that: "A Philippine Red Cross had provided considerable aid for the victims of typhoon Winde during the past 10 days, but was unable to cope with the relief of more than 500,000 victims who were in need of assistance. The cash donation was cabled to Manila for the purchase of relief supplies in the immediate area."
