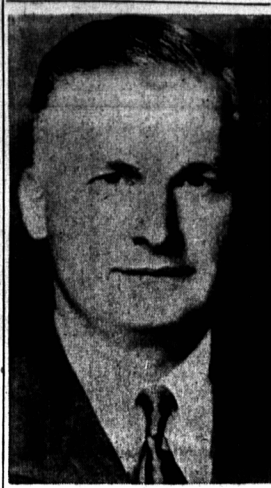


### Nominated To Contest 3rd King's For Liberals

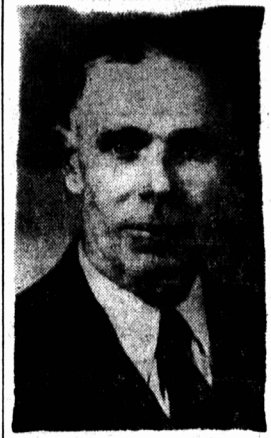

The nomination of Mr. Clark was moved by Beecher Dewar of Brudenell, seconded by Mac MacKenzie of Victoria Cross. There were no other nominees. The confirmation of Mr. Campbell's nomination was moved by Douglas MacLaren, Montague, and seconded by Fred Matheson, Dundas.

The largely attended meeting was presided over by the district president, Mr. Hugh McEachern. Both Mr. Clark and Mr. Campbell expressed their thanks for the nomination which they had received. Mr. George Saville, candidate for Fifth King's, spoke briefly on the Liberal record of the past twenty years.

### In Memoriam

**ALOYSIUS SULLIVAN**  
On Jan. 12, 1955, the people of Vernon were grieved to hear of the sudden passing on that morning of Mr. Aloysius Sullivan, one of the most respected and highly esteemed residents of the community.

Mr. Sullivan, who was in his 79th year, had until recent years enjoyed good health, and, on the morning of his death, was as usual about his work in the post office at his home in Vernon. Death, however, came suddenly due to a heart condition which he developed a few years ago.

As a young man he was employed for some years in Boston but he later returned to his native province where he took charge of the creamery at Orwell Cove. He afterwards was manager of the creamery at Vernon where he continued till his retirement about eight years ago.

During those years he made many friends who found him to be a man of sound judgment, of strict honesty and of unfailing devotion to duty. He was always willing to lend a helping hand to those who sought assistance and his home at Vernon was frequently the centre of many happy gatherings of neighbors and other friends.

Four years ago he and his wife, the former Lauretta Finley, celebrated the golden anniversary of their marriage, at which time they had the happiness of having all the surviving members of their family present with them.

He received the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church from Rev. Nazaire Gallant, assistant priest of Vernon River parish of which he was a devoted member. He leaves to mourn, besides his sorrowing wife, the following members of his family, all of whom were present for his funeral: Frances, Mrs. Albert Schmidt, Davidson, Sask.; Arthur E., Montague; Mary, Mrs. Frank Donnelly, Newton, Mass.; Enid, Mrs. Philip Ross, Melville; William, Norwood, Mass.; Helen, Mrs. Leslie Murray, Norwood, Mass.; Margaret, Mrs. Dr. J. A. MacLaren, Bath, N.B.; and Guy N., Charlottetown.

Also left to mourn is one sister, Catherine Sullivan, Newton, Mass. A son, William, died about forty years ago and another son, John R., lost his life while on service with the Royal Canadian Air Force overseas during World War II. A daughter, Catherine, died in Winnipeg four years ago. His funeral took place on Jan. 15 to St. Joachim's Church, Vernon River, where the funeral Mass was offered by Rev. J. A. Sullivan. Present in the sanctuary during the Mass were Rev. Urban Gillis, pastor of Vernon River, and Rev. Phelan McKenna, Morell, Rev. Nazaire Gallant directed the choir. The services at the grave were conducted by Rev. Phelan McKenna.

Einstein was born in Ulm, Germany, of middle-class Jewish parents. Educated first in Roman Catholic schools, by 10 he evinced an interest in subjects other than his age shed away from.

**DOCTORATE AT 21**  
He mastered every problem in a geometry book in three months and then turned to philosophy with the same all-consuming vigor.

His higher education was at the Polytechnic Academy, in Zurich, Switzerland, graduating in 1900 at 21.

Five years later he introduced his theory of relativity and achieved world-wide acclaim. It was a revolutionary study of time and motion and combined with later studies added a fourth dimension—time—to the measurement of matter of length, depth and width.

Out of his studies of relativity and gravitation also came the disclosure that matter, even its lightest form, is energy. Uranium 235, used in the atom bomb, proved him right.

**DIFFERED WITH NEWTON**  
Other studies led to the conclusion that motion is relative, that the speed of light is constant and that light from stars bends as the rays pass close to the sun on their journey to the earth. The

### Discuss Paving Program At Town Council Meeting

A program for paving the main street of Montague was proposed last night at the postponed regular Town Council meeting presided over by Mayor Bruce H. Yebo. All councillors were present.

It was proposed that the main street be coated with three inches of heavy pavement to make a permanent job. It was also proposed that the streets already paved with light pavement be re-coated this year.

### Scores Fallacies Of Racial Discrimination

"If peace on earth is to become a reality, we must expose the myth that one race has been created superior to another," said Kenneth A. Parker, supervisor of City Schools in addressing Trinity Men's Association at their monthly supper meeting last night.

The speaker said that the first chapter of Genesis was one of the most scientific articles ever written. He said that in it is the story of Creation and in the 27th verse it states, "and God created man in his own image; in his own image made he him". Man was given a soul through which he was able to conceive of his creator.

Continuing in support of his argument regarding the equality of the human race, Mr. Parker said that there were two factors supporting this contention: "Of what we know, every man has descended from Adam and Eve—all have a common parentage. As they expanded from this biological origin, they became isolated, inbred and developed certain characteristics according to the country which they inhabited. With the coming of more developed means of transportation the contacts between the different groups increased. No longer were they isolated or inbred."

"Only physical traits can be inherited in the sperm plasma. Before the Franco-Spanish war, Germany was spoken of as a stupid indolent race with no inclination toward war. With the coming of Bismark their thinking was changed and the subsequent regimes under the Kaiser and Hitler made them one of the most ruthless of nations. Japan also was once described as primitive, unwarlike and stupid but with agriculture being replaced more and more by industrial development and the young children indoctrinated with feelings of hatred for their fellowman, we have latter proposition differed slightly from the long-accepted version of Isaac Newton.

**A-POWER AS DETERRENT**  
But, after the first atom bomb was dropped on Hiroshima in 1945 Einstein made public the misgivings he felt by commenting: "At present atomic energy is not a boon to mankind, but a menace."

The one chance he saw of averting total destruction, he said, was that "it may intimidate the human race to bring order into its international affairs, which, without pressure of fear, it undoubtedly would not do."

Einstein is survived by two sons by his first marriage, Hans Albert, 50, professor of engineering at the University of California, and Edward, 45, in Switzerland, and a stepdaughter, Margo, 85, who lived with him. His first marriage to Mileva Maric in 1903 ended in divorce. The second was to Elsa Einstein, his first cousin, in 1919. She died in 1936.

**ONTARIO SAFEST PLACE**  
BROCKVILLE, Ont. (CP)—Ontario is the safest place in the world to work, Eugene E. Sparrow, chairman of the Ontario workers' compensation board, told employers here. Mr. Sparrow said statistics show fewer industrial accidents occur in Ontario than anywhere else in the world. He credited the efforts of safety organizations.

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian welfare council annual meeting will be in Windsor May 5, 6 and 7. It was announced Saturday. It will discuss immigrant welfare, family desertion, juvenile delinquency and other social problems, the council said.

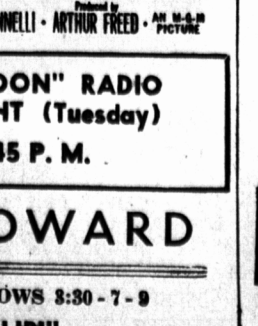
