MAYOR and FIVE COUNCILLORS

For the City of Charlottetown

Will be held on TUESDAY, 6th AUGUST next, at the several Places following, that is to say:

- In Ward No. 1—At the Store of Messrs. J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets.
- In Ward No. 2—At the Coach House of Richard Heartz, Esquire, fronting on Sydney Street.
- In Ward No. 3—At the City Hall.
- In Ward No. 4—At the Fire Engine House, fronting on King's Square.
- In Ward No. 5—At the House of Mr. Dennis Lyons, corner of Great George and Euston Streets.

And at the said Elections the Poll will be opened at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open till 5 in the afternoon of the same day.

DESCRIPTION OF WARDS:

"Number One shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Dorchester Street. Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton and north of Richmond Streets. Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy and north of Grafton Streets. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town."—*Sec 18 Vic. HIS Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council was this day pleased to fix and determine the rate at which the amount of the Invoice of Dutiable Goods, imported into this Island from the United States of America, shall, in estimating the duties payable thereon, be reduced into current money of the Island, as follows:—

In all cases where such Invoices shall be made out in Dollars and Cents of the paper currency of the United States, the amount of such Invoice shall be reduced into current money of this Island, by allowing for each Dollar the sum of FOUR SHILLINGS AND SIX-PENCE, and in the like proportion for any fraction of a Dollar; of which all Collectors of Impost are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.
