## Lobster Prices Drop Five Cents

A drop of five cents in the price of lobsters and almost complete lack of market size lobsters along most of the North Shore were reported by industry spokesmen to the Guardian today. The present price of 30 cents for canners and 25 cents for markets compares with the 35 and 60 cents paid up to Monday of this week. Reliable spokesmen said last night the 50 and 55 cent price structure was uniform across the Maritime Provinces yesterday. Previously Island fishermen had been enjoying a comfortable bulge in returns over the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick people.

## Locked Gates Are Blamed In Tragedy

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Locked gates at the end of exit tunnel in Lima's sports stadium were blamed by some witnesses Monday for the deaths of hundreds of stampeding fans at a soccer game. Still reeling from the shock of the sport world's worst disaster, officials were unable to estimate the toll of dead 24 hours after the tragedy. Newspaper estimates from 200 to 315 fatalities with hundreds more injured. Earlier estimates had said between 400 and 300 died.

## ADB Aiming To Keep N.B. Foundry Open

OTTAWA (CP) — Transport Minister Pickersill said Monday night the Atlantic Development Board will do all it can to preserve the McEvilly Foundry at Saint John, N.B., scheduled to close this August. If the board fails to keep the brass foundry operating, it will work with all agencies—federal, provincial and municipal—in assisting the displaced workers, he said.
