

SDU Takes Surprise Game From Aces In City League Opener 9-8

The Saint Dunstan's hockey team pulled the surprise upset of the season when they took the opening game of the City League finals 9-8, from Summerside Aces in a fast, wide open game of hockey which was played before about six hundred fans at the Forum last night.

The Red and White squad built up a 4-3 lead in the first period which they increased by four goals in the second. But in spite of their five goal advantage going into the third, they had difficulty in stopping a withering Summerside attack which netted them five goals and got to within one goal of tying the game. Even when McInnis was withdrawn at the last minute, however, the Aces could not get the all important equalizer. Only Roy's goal at 9:06 in the third saved the Saints from losing the game.

The game which saw plenty of speed and hard body checks handed out was devoid of any real rough stuff and only two penalties were assessed. The line of Summerside Aces was outstanding. Mooney Gallant received a gash on the head near the end of the second period which required several stitches to close and did not return to the ice for the third.

The Aces actually won their game in the second period when the Aces defence seemed to fall apart and the MacAdam coached boys roamed at will over the blue-line in front of McInnis. The line of Cormier, Lemieux and Roy were outstanding for the University boys and Gillis stopped many difficult shots when the Aces swarmed in on him. Paul Schurman, Romaine, Taylor, Gallant and Pope carried the attack for the Summerside team and accounted for all of the goals.

Probe Report Of Attack On Referee

MONTREAL, (CP)—President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League said Wednesday he is investigating a reported attack on referee Bill Chadwick by Tod Sloan of Toronto Maple Leafs but no action will be taken before tonight's Toronto-Detroit game.

Campbell has already been advised of the incident by referee-in-chief Carl Voss, who attended Tuesday night's game in Detroit. Campbell will talk with both Chadwick and Sloan.

Sloan was given both misconduct and game misconduct penalties in the game between the Leafs and Detroit Red Wings.

When the game misconduct was imposed Sloan is reported to have leaped from the penalty box, pushed Chadwick and almost knocked him to the ice.

Maple Leafs Hope To Crack 13 Jinx Tonight

DETROIT, (AP)—Toronto Maple Leafs, hockey's best playoff team, hope to crack the unlucky "13 jinx" tonight and even their Stanley Cup hockey series against Detroit Red Wings.

The Maple Leafs, who have captured the Stanley Cup more often than any other team—nine times—haven't won in Detroit's Olympia Stadium in their last 13 tries.

The most recent setback, of course, was Tuesday night when they were blanked 5-0 by the Red Wings, who took a 1-0 lead in the best-of-seven semi-final series.

"The Leafs are a better club than they showed Tuesday night," Detroit general manager Jack Adams told his players. "I wouldn't be surprised if they carried this to six or seven games."

Patrick Ponders Lineup For 2nd Game Of Series

MONTREAL, (CP)—While coach Lynn Patrick of Boston Bruins pondered Wednesday whether to use three or four forward lines, coach Dick Irvin of Montreal Canadiens went into the country to commune with a flock of chickens.

Patrick obviously had more to worry about. His team dropped a 2-0 decision to Canadiens Tuesday night in the opening game of the best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final.

Patrick said he told his team before they left Boston that Irvin would probably use four intact lines, dropping one defenceman, a system that beat the Bruins in the cup final last year.

Patrick countered with four lines, but he had two green farmhands on one and he had to go along without Gus Bodnar, a handy centre who is also good at defensive work and penalty-killing.

Laycoe May Return
He indicated there was some possibility of defenceman Hal Laycoe, left in Boston because of a groin injury, showing up for the Thursday game. If that comes about, Patrick figured he might use four defencemen and only three full lines. He would drop forward Gayle Fielder, brought along for the playoffs with Wayne Brown from Seattle of the Western Hockey League.

If Laycoe is not available, Patrick will again use four lines and one most likely will include Bodnar. The centre, who became ill from stomach flu the day of the first game, felt much better Wednesday.

Patrick said he thought Canadiens played a strong game, good defensively and always on top of the puck.

In view of Canadiens' win, Irvin likely will go along with the same squad in the second game, using only four defencemen and having four intact lines.

The players who weren't used in the opener worked out Wednesday at the Forum. They were goalie Gerry McNeill, defenceman Jim MacPherson, centre Elmer Lach and winger Calum (Baldy) MacKay.

MacKay may not see action in the series. He is still recovering from an injured knee. Lach is the most likely to be called on at any time. The veteran centre can take over the pivot spot on any line in case of injuries or to give another centre man a full game's rest.

SYDNEY, (CP)—Halifax Atlantics made up for mediocre play with deadly shooting to defeat Sydney Millionaires 6-3 Wednesday night and take a 2-0 lead in the best-of-nine Maritime Major Hockey League finals. The third game will be played here Friday.

Atlantics found themselves in an unusual defensive role as the peppery Mills, bolstered by the return of centre George Robertson and defenceman Andy McCallum, carried the play to the ciadel guarded by Halifax goalie Roy McMeekin.

McMeekin, whose pre-game antics to ward off a jinx apparently again brought him luck, was as sensational as the Mills were inaccurate. In the first four minutes, with Halifax a man short, they flubbed on three golden chances.

The chubby McMeekin, who stopped 29 shots to Norm Defelice's 17, always slips his teammates across the back of their padded pants with the back of his stick "to bring me luck."
