HOT BISCUIT SUPPER-SANDWICH

Season to taste 1 c. minced cooked meat with grated onion, salt, pepper and condiment sauce; moisten slightly with leftover gravy or cream sauce. Mix and sift twice, then sift into a bowl, 2 c. once-sifted pastry flour (or 1 1/2 c. once-sifted hard-wheat flour), 4 tps. Magic Baking Powder, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. dry mustard. Cut in finely 5 ts. chilled shortening. Make a well in dry ingredients and add 1/2 c. chili sauce and 1/2 c. milk; mix lightly with a fork, adding milk if necessary, to make a soft dough. Knead for 10 seconds on a lightly-floured board and divide dough into 2 equal portions. Pat one portion into a greased round 8 1/2" cake pan and spread almost to edges with meat mixture; moisten edges of dough with water. Pat second portion of dough into an 8 1/2" round and place over meat mixture; press lightly around edges to seal; score top layer deeply into 6 pie-shaped wedges. Bake in hot oven, 425°, about 20 mins. Serve hot with brown tomato sauce. Yield: 6 servings.

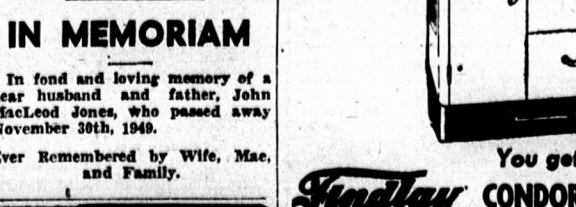

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. W. J. SEAMAN

The death of Sophia Elizabeth Brown, wife of William J. Seaman of Springfield, Lot 67, Prince Edward Island, occurred at her home on Thursday evening, November 8th, 1951.

Mrs. Seaman had been ill only a few days and news of her passing came as a great shock to her friends and relatives. At the time of her death she was a devoted member of the United Church of Canada, active in the Women's Missionary Society and a teacher in the Sunday School.

She had a keen interest in the missionary work of her church. Just one year prior to her death, friends and relatives gathered to celebrate her golden wedding and it was typical of her that she should wish that the very generous donation received on that occasion be given as a special thank offering to the work of the Foreign Missions.

A woman of broad outlook and singularly gentle and kind in spirit, Mrs. Seaman will be sorely missed by family, community and friends.

Sophia Brown was born on Oct. 28, 1872, at Margate, Prince Edward Island, daughter of William Brown and Elizabeth Clarke. Before her marriage she taught school in different districts throughout the Province for a period of eight years. She married William J. Seaman at Margate, on the 6th of February, 1901. The early part of their married life was spent at Wheatley River but later they moved to Springfield where they have lived ever since.

Surviving, besides her husband, are her daughter Irene (Mrs. Leslie Ramsay) Hamilton, and two sons, Lorne at Breadalbane and Cedric at home; also ten grandchildren. She was predeceased by one son, William Alfred, Honorary Captain in the United Church Chaplain Corps connected with the Canadian Army in World War II. Capt. Seaman died of wounds received while on active duty in France in July 1914.

Mrs. Seaman was one of a large family of whom three brothers and five sisters still survive: Andrew L. Broadview, Saskatchewan; Alex J. Long River; Harry, Kensington; Janie, Mrs. Andrew Johnstone, Long River; Elizabeth, Mrs. L. B. Linkletter, Kensington; Fannie, Mrs. Percy Miller, Lot 16; Emily, Mrs. Major Whitehead, Kensington; Mabel, Mrs. D. M. MacKenzie, Kensington.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. L. M. Murray assisted by Rev. D. A. Campbell and Rev. W. B. MacPhail. Hymns sung during life service were: "What A Friend We Have in Jesus"; and "Forever With the Lord". A duet, "Going Down the Valley" was beautifully rendered by Andrew Johnstone and Ernest Dunning of Long River.

Canadian Assoc. Of Welfare Workers Meets In Fredericton, N. B.

The November meeting of the N. B. - P. E. I. Branch of the Canadian Association of Social Workers was held in Fredericton on November 24th, with Mrs. Warneford in charge of the meeting.

The first business under discussion was the survey of the Public Health and Welfare Services of N. B., which is expected to be released shortly. Reports from the various standing committees were read and new members, Miss Anne Harrington and Mr. Stan Matherson were welcomed to the branch.

Miss K. Phyllis Burns, executive secretary of the Child Welfare Division of the Canadian Welfare Council, was then introduced by Miss Reynolds. Miss Burns spoke on the coming National Conference on Social Work to be held in Quebec City in June 1952. She expressed the hope that New Brunswick and P. E. I. will be well represented since it will be in easy reach of the Maritimes and will be bi-lingual. The conference is being planned especially for agencies under religious auspices as well as the general public who are interested in welfare problems.

After the meeting the members were entertained at a tea given at the home of Miss Kathleen Morrissey, Supervisor of Welfare Services (family allowances), Dept. of National Health and Welfare.
