New Charges Laid in Police Court

Three new charges were laid against two Charlottetown residents, in regard to the taking of a truck without the owner's consent and the subsequent accident, by Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday morning. Evidence of the first case previously called against one of the witnesses was completed and the case adjourned until Friday for consideration.

Additional charges laid, were that of criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle resulting in bodily harm, and that of creating public mischief by misleading the R.C.M.P. against one party, and that of joy-riding against the second person. Both, when given an option of trial, elected to be tried by a judge without a jury. The cases were then adjourned for preliminary hearing on Friday afternoon.
