CAMPUS ROBBERY

One evening last week, a UPEI security officer watched as a DJ at CIMN radio put a CD into his pocket and proceeded to leave the building. Once outside, the officer apprehended the student.

The problem of thefts from the station has been around for a number of years. Each year the rate of thefts increases as the end of the year nears, only this year the rates were high at the beginning of the year. This problem posed a serious threat to the station's large selection of CDs and tapes.

To help stop the thefts, the station implemented a new security pass system for the station's dozens of volunteers. This was done with little avail for the thefts continued. Increased surveillance on the CD library and on the volunteers finally paid off.

When the management started to suspect one volunteer, it had a security guard secretly watch the DJ during his show. During that time the DJ proceeded to take a CD and when his show was over he left with the CD. The security person followed the man outside and apprehended him there.

When the management was first notified of this, they were anxious to have charges pressed. This would be in line with the message the station has been trying to relay to the volunteers in the past and would show how serious the station was in stopping this problem.

As the details of the incident progressed the idea of charges were dropped and the student was instead barred from the station and given a \$50 fine. Station

manager Rodney St. Pierre initially felt disappointed at the decision since it failed to reinforce the message that the station was trying to give about theirs in the station, but later realized that given the specific details of this incident, the punishment was satisfactory. He added that the next time an incident of this manner occurs, the punishment will follow the full extent of the law.
