New Bridge To Be Erected In Valleyfield

A new bridge of steel and concrete is to be erected across the Valleyfield stream at the site of the former Sutherland's Mills near Montague, according to reports received yesterday.

The new bridge will replace the old one which is too light to carry the heavy traffic, and is in fact already giving signs of bearing too heavy loads. Approximately 46 feet long, the bridge has a centre pile support which has been moved out of position from the heavy pressure. Also the crib-work at both approaches is gradually wearing away, leaving little support at either end. As the bridge now stands, there are two water-ways, one flowing on either side of the central support. Since the volume of water flowing in this stream is very great, and the two ten-foot waterways insufficient, the current has removed the bed around the support piles to make the bridge somewhat unsafe for heavy traffic.

The new bridge with a 24-foot roadway will replace the old 18-foot one. It will also have a central span of 30 feet and two approach spans of 18 feet each. It will be 17 feet above water, the same as the old one. The central support will have a central support, thus giving a 30-foot waterway, which will be amply sufficient to carry off the volume of water even during the spring freshet.

The contractors, Noye and Bagole, Summerside, are at present engaged in driving the new piles into position. There will be six at each end of the 30-foot span, and five at the outer ends of the 18-foot spans. Above the piles are six double I-beams welded together for greater support, with single I-beams adding to the strength of the structure. Above the added steel work, the concrete will be laid.

After the main truss work has been completed, the old approaches will be removed to make way for the new stone work, which will slant from the top approach of the 18-foot span to the bottom of the 30-foot span. The stone is to be hand laid, and protected at the bottom to prevent moving by the current.

The new bridge has been designed to carry all the heavy traffic which may pass over it, and it is expected, after the completion of the new bridge at Montague, the volume of traffic passing over the Sutherland bridge will increase greatly.
